Shoo! Hens Off Artemesia Roads. Poultry and Horses Must Not Run At Large on the Highways of the Township.

Artemesia Council met in the town hall, Flesherton, on Saturday, May 3. Members all present. The Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. Communications as follows were read: W. H. Thurston, account for printing Auditors' Report, \$36.40. W. A. Armstrong, account for exchange of draft re account rate, \$1.50; Owen Sound General and Marine Hospital, notices as to taxes, charged for patients; the Reeve and Clerk, report as to expenditure on townline Artemesia and Proton; Samuel Fisher and 34 others, protesting against opening up of streets in Eugenia now occupied by Robert Williams; By-law No. 764, to authorize a loan of \$4500 for current expenditure, was passed after receiving its several readings. McLeod's report - That W. H. Thurston's account for \$36.40, for printing auditors' report of 1912, be paid - Carried.

Brown-Caswell-That the Treasurer be allowed \$1.50, exchange on draft remitting county rates to county treasurer - Carried. Caswell-McLeod - That \$75 be granted towards laying cement sidewalk in Eugenia, provided the commissioner for Div. 4 expend \$25 of his appropriation for same and the village expend as much as possible of their statute labor for the same purpose, and the commissioner for the division have the oversight of the work and make written report to this Council - Carried. Brown-McLeod-That the report of the Reeve and Clerk as to settlement of moneys expended on townline Artemesia and Proton be received and filed; and they be paid the sum of \$3 each for their services - Carried.

Graham-Caswell-That Robert Campbell be paid \$100 for right of way for road on lot 24, con. 12, in lieu of 12 con. line upon him furnishing this council with title to the same - Carried. Brown-Graham-That Collector J. K. Jamieson be refunded \$10, being amount overpaid on collector's roll for 1912 - Carried. Graham-McLeod-That this Council having viewed the condition of the bridge at Priceville when meeting there, and considering that it will stand for some time yet, the Clerk notify the Police Trustees of Priceville that certain repairs should be made by them to strengthen the supports to make it safer - Carried. Caswell-Graham-That By-Law appointing overseers for 1913 be amended by inserting the names of W. T. Genoe as pathmaster in Div. No. 27 instead of George Snell, and John Stann instead of Nelson Freewing in Div. No. 30 - Carried. Caswell-McLeod - That this Council will not recognize any expenditure on the townline between this township and the township of Proton, unless notice has been given to this council and ordered to be done, and the several commissioners interested are requested to settle up any expenditure on said townline in the year it is incurred, and a copy of the notice be forwarded to Proton Council - Carried.

McLeod - Brown - That this Council pay wages while expending appropriation on roads - For ordinary work, men \$1.75 per day; for man and team, ordinary, \$3.25 per day; for man and team on grader, \$3.50 per day - Carried. Graham-Caswell-That the domestic animals hereinafter mentioned are prohibited from running at large upon the highways of this municipality subject to being impounded: Horses of any description or age, entire animals of any kind, geese, turkeys, hens and all other poultry, and the owner or occupant of any land shall be responsible for any damage caused by any animal or poultry under his charge and keeping, notwithstanding that any property may not be enclosed by fence - Carried. Graham - McLeod - That Mr. Traynor be requested to report to this Council as to the condition of the contract let to Mr. McLeod, and as to the cause of the present defective condition, and he have the contract completed according to contract without further delay - Carried. Graham - Caswell - That we should advise the ratemakers placing or about to place mail box posts on the highway not to heed the Advance that our resolution of a former meeting was superfluous, in view of the opinion of the Municipal World advises that posts upon the highway are an abstraction, and as to the decision of the courts, estate of Dillon against the counties of Lambton and Middlesex where damages of \$5000 were awarded owing to the road not being 22 feet wide, and also the opinion of the Deputy Postmaster General, the posts should not intrude upon the highway, the instructions to patrons on rural routes do not require the boxes to be near the travelled portion of the highway.
