Hon. I. B. Lucas Gets Portfolio Unopposed.

East and Centre Grey Liberals So Decided at Flesherton Last Friday.

The East and Centre Grey Liberals in annual convention at Flesherton on Friday last decided to allow Hon. I. B. Lucas' election to go unopposed. The new Provincial Treasurer therefore received the portfolio on Monday without a contest. The meeting, which was a representative one, passed unanimously the following resolutions: "That the Liberals of East and Centre Grey in convention assembled hereby assure our Dominion Liberal leader, Sir Wilfred Laurier, and his able followers at Ottawa, that we fully endorse their action in the debate on the naval bill, and believe their action on that question to indicate the only way that Canada can take her place as one of the nations in our great Empire. And we fully assure them we will be ready to do all we are able to do to return a supporter of the Liberal party in East Grey when the opportunity is given us."

"That the Liberals of the political party of the Province of Ontario, in their determination to risk his political life on the question of abolishing the bar, thus placing all communities in the Province of Ontario on equal footing, and insuring a real sentiment by removing the temptations from the rising generation. We also strongly condemn the autocratic action of Sir James Whitney and his followers in preventing a fair inquiry into the charges of corruption which by Mr. Proudfoot, M.P.P., which we believe he is able to prove."

The following officers were elected at the ensuing year: Pres., Wm. McLoughry; Vice-President, Dr. Moore; Secretary-Treasurer, W. H. G. G. Maxwell. The Township Vice-Presidents remain the same as last year.

At the Nomination meeting in Flesherton on Monday no candidate was brought forward to oppose Hon. I. B. Lucas, so he is therefore elected by acclamation.

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
