Review of the Session

Dominion Parliament Prorogued on Friday Night Last—Session Leads in History.

Dominion Parliament at Ottawa is prorogued and R. C. Miller, the State prisoner is free.

The House sat continuously for two weeks, night and day, except two hours for dinner from 6 to 8, and on Sunday, and then adjourned amidst turbulent scenes of party passion on the famous Saturday night, March 15.

For the first time on record a vote of censure was moved against the Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons.

The Finance Minister announced the record surplus of \$55,000,000. Trade figures for the last fiscal year were announced to have passed the billion dollar mark.

The Government brought down the Conservative tariff reductions. A reciprocal trade treaty with the West Indies was ratified.

A grant of \$10,000,000 was made in aid of agriculture. A measure empowering the Postmaster-General to introduce Parcel Post in Canada was passed.
