25 YEARS AGO Items of General Interest From The Standard Files of June 14, 1888.

Durham is going to try block pavements for sidewalks. Mrs. R. H. Byers, of Rochester, is visiting friends in this village and vicinity. Messrs. Stephen Bros., of Markford, have bought our Messrs. Manley & Co., of that town. A Turner & Co., of the Medical Hall, Markdale, have sold their business to Mr. W. J. Manley, of Owen Sound. W. L. Davis has gone out of the furniture business and left for Toronto, there to enter the real estate business. Lilburn's new roller mill at Holland Centre was destroyed by fire on Thursday night. It was valued at about \$10,000. On Wednesday, the 30th May, 1888, Mr. C. C. Lee, of Bracebridge and Miss Francis Reynolds, of this village, were united in wedlock. James A. Rowe, son of John Rowe, formerly of Vandeaur, has received Government papers as a first-class civil engineer in the West, and has a salary of \$50 a month. A shell loaded with matches broke down in Benson's grocery store a few days ago and smoke started up in various places, the matches having caught fire by the concussion, but were promptly extinguished. J. E. Marsh, of the Markdale House, is transforming the roller rink into a public hall and expects to have it in shape by July. The building will have a seating capacity for 600. Prohibition King has the fast connections and by reading over his pedigree you will find he is of the same family as Minor Her 1,594; the only horse, living or dead, that ever beat Dan Patch; Lady of the Manor 2,014; Dara Devil 2,099; Heir at Law 2,044; Lord Derby 2,053; Nightingale 2,038; Mocking Boy 2,053; King Charles 2,093; Relative 2,053; Mambrino King 1279; The Abbott 2,024; Shadow Chimera 2,05; The Monk 2,053; and hundreds of others with very low records. His dam Nettie F., by Prohibition 2214, 21812, by Petoskey 3933, he by Geo. Wilkes 519 was one of the few to have 158 first prizes and Diplomas to her credit, and that she speaks for herself is the best evidence that can be given.
