Then a claim was put forward that-what was called an Arab was really an African horse, originating in Lybia, the country lying between Egypt and Tripoli, on the shores of the Mediterranean.

These wise people even asserted that the horses we have always called Arabians were never in Arabia until after the beginning of the Christian era, some going from still Egypt, others sent from Capadocia. north of the Taurus mountains, on the Black Sea. The fact that no such horses remain either in Lybia or in Capadocia, although they are numerous in Arabia, caused no embarrassment to these pundits.
