Second Week at Niagara Camp

The Niagara Camp of 1913 is over, finished, done or past, whichever way you may care to put it.

The boys are all home again without illness or accident. We had one or two casualties in the sham battle, a couple of F Coys. men having been tagged by the Umpire as out of action, but the "make believe" wounds were not long in healing and even Pte. Welsh, the most seriously injured, is quite himself again.

You will understand, of course, that in mimic warfare only blank ammunition is used, and consequently, no one is hurt. Men are not even allowed to wear their bayonets for fear that in a moment of excitement they might use them "with intent."

In order, therefore, to make the game more realistic and to provide the stretcher-bearers and field ambulances with practice men here and there are tagged by the Umpire with a big white ticket and ordered to drop behind.

F. Coy's troubles bulked no larger than these two pretended accidents, and surely there is reason to be thankful that we had an outing of such duration so pleasant and profitable and are returned without mishap.

I think that what notes were sent you last week brought us up to the Sunday Church Parade. The boys were all back in camp by "lights out," some were hungry, and all were short of change.

Monday morning all those who had failed to qualify for their efficiency pay were sent down to the ranges for another chance.

The remainder, under the supervision of Instructor Colman of Royal Canadians, practised advanced guard and rear guard actions. These manoeuvres were continued during the afternoon.

On Tuesday three or four regiments, including the 31st, went out to the Government property at the Chatamoupin Range for a practice on "The Attack." Firing line and supports. Ten rounds of blank ammunition per man were used.

The same afternoon we had rifle practice at moving figures at the ranges. Instead of shooting at a large round, still target, one was required to shoot at a target about the size and shape of the head and shoulders of a man. This figure was attached to the end of a long pole, came into view without notice and remained in sight for six seconds. Although the result did not count as efficiency it was good practice, approaching actual conditions in the field, and the boys did very well at it.

Wednesday morning the regiment put in a couple of hours on Battalion drill and rehearsed the review and march past which was scheduled for Thursday. About three o'clock same day we moved out-of-camp on our way to the big fight. Every man carried his rifle and greatestcoat. Bayonets were filled with lunch enough to do for supper and breakfast. All the forces in camp were divided into two opposing armies.
