The new Armory has 62 feet frontage on Main Street, extending 106 feet to the rear. It faces on the street where the main entrance is in the form of a double doorway. The building is of solid red brick construction, with trimmings of cement and cement foundations. The building is set back 30 feet from the street, and notwithstanding the fact that it is crowded rather closely in between two residences has rather an imposing appearance.

Fatal Gun Accident

A most unfortunate accident and one that caused fatal results befel Mr. John Staples, of near Durham, brother of Mr. Jas. Staples, of Markdale, on Thursday morning of last week. He had discharged one shot from a double-barrelled gun at some crows and while in the act of hanging the gun up, the nail caught the trigger and the contents of the other barrel went into the upper part of his leg near the body. Mr. Staples was widely known throughout Glenora township and surrounding country, having been a pioneer thresher, a successful farmer, a Deputy-Returning Officer over a score of years, and a most obliging, kindly neighbor. He and his wife had more than their share of sorrow, as they have lost several members of the family from the dreaded "white plague."

Armoury Completed.

Formally Taken Over By the Militia Authorities on Thursday Last. The armoury building which has been undergoing erection during the past nine months was formally taken over by the Militia Authorities by the Contractor on Thursday last week. The board of inspection composed of Major Caldwell, Divisional Engineer (Chairman), and Capt. Milson, of the Army Service Corps, Toronto, and Capt. L. G. Campbell, of the 31st Regt. (members) made a careful examination of the building from roof to basement and were well enough satisfied with the construction and finish. A few minor details of the contract looked over but so little consequence as not to warrant rejection of the work.

The ground between the front of the building and the street line will be graded and sodded and a cement walk laid. The rear entrance will be provided with steps giving an approach to King Edward Park. Furniture for the rooms, and fittings for the equipment store-rooms will also come later. A caretaker will be permanently in charge and we understand that it is the intention of the Company to keep open house except during the hot summer months. They certainly have a home to be proud of and if their energy is properly directed it will be hard to estimate the wide range of benefits.

Her casket was covered with beautiful flowers, the gifts of her many friends in Vancouver and Winnipeg. She was a lifelong Presbyterian and a great worker in her Church.

One of the pioneers of the place is being moved from the flesh. Mr. Ritchie, who was a resident here for 56 years, passed peacefully away on the 15th July, in his 85th year. His funeral obsequies will be held at the home of his son, F. J. Ritchie, on Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. He was a member of the L.O.L., and had been one of the first members of this lodge during its infancy. He joined the Order in the '60's and had been a member for many years.

66 years. Rev. Mr. Phalen conducted an appropriate service at the house and also assisted at the grave. The pall bearers were Messrs. A. Ferguson, A. L. Walker, W. J. Gibson and C. W. Rutledge. Deceased was a man of integrity and high morals, fond of work and without an enemy. He was a member of the Trinity Methodist church for forty years, and was a custom carding and weaving business, also, for a time, a brickmaker in connection. He married in 1853 Miss Margaret H. Irving, who died over seven years ago, and of the family of seven sons, only two survive, F. J., electrician in this place, and Thos. C., electrician on the Durham Furniture Co. in Toronto.
