Throughout the Dominion the proportion of illiterates has fallen from 14 to 10 per hundred since the previous census in 1901. Saskatchewan has shown the greatest improvement-from 35 per cent. to 13. Every other province shows some amberation in the educational condition of its inhabitants. In Ontario, for instance, despite the large increase in population there are 24,000 fewer illiterates than there were ten years ago. Only in the three prairie provinces has there been an increase in the total of those who cannot read nor write, and that, of course, is due to the large influx of foreign-born immigrants.




