LATEST DIPHTHERIA CURE. Hot Air Method Adopted by Dr Rendu, of Paris.

Dr. Rendu, of Paris, has a novel and seemingly successful method of treating diphtheria by inhalations of hot air. Having proved that the microbes of diphtheria are destroyed by exposure to a heat of 140 de grees F. for five minutes or of 158 degrees for two minutes, he tried the effect of air at such temperatures upon the disease itself.

Diphtheria is generally localized in the upper respiratory passages. Dr. Rendu first experimented upon himself to ascertain how great a heat his throat would bear. He found that he could inhale dry air at 212 degrees F. for two minutes. and at 140 degrees for half an hour. the temperature being taken at its entrance to the mouth. It was of course, necessary to protect the lips and the rest of the face, which he did with compresses soaked in

water. Having proved what the human throat could bear, Dr. Rendu tried the hot-air treatment upon thirtythree others with the ordinary antidiphtheric scrum. The results were dentical, the mortality being 15 per cent. in each case.


