**Markdale.****Widows Have Protection**

Insurance Law Case—Appellate  
Decision Decides Knotty Point  
In Decision Given at Osgoode  
Hall on Monday.

That the insurance laws of Ontario throw a shielding arm over widows and children is the effect of a decision handed out by the Appellate Division at Osgoode Hall on Monday. The court reverses the decision of Mr. Justice Middleton in the action brought against the A.O.U.W. by Mrs. Alice Lloyd, and directs that \$1,000 in court be paid out to her.

The question at issue arose from a policy for \$2,000 on the life of James L. Lloyd, of Walkerton, of which he directed that one-half be paid to his wife, Sarah Anna Lloyd, and the other half to his daughter, Maty Eliza Lloyd, now Mrs. Birtch. The first wife died, and Mr. Lloyd married again. Mrs. Alice Lloyd is the second wife.

On the death of James L. Lloyd, the daughter claimed the entire proceeds of the policy as Sarah Anne Lloyd was dead.

Mr. Justice Hodgins, who writes the judgment of the Appellate Division says: "The insurance contract must be read as creating a trust of one-half in favor of the assured only, such wife being, by force of the statutory definition, the wife living at the maturity of the contract, notwithstanding the fact that the first wife was designated by name."

His Lordship points out that this reading of the statute is more in consonance with the spirit of our insurance legislation as to wives and children.

Each party will pay her own costs.
