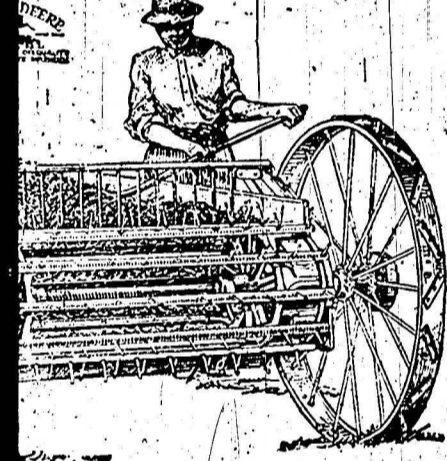

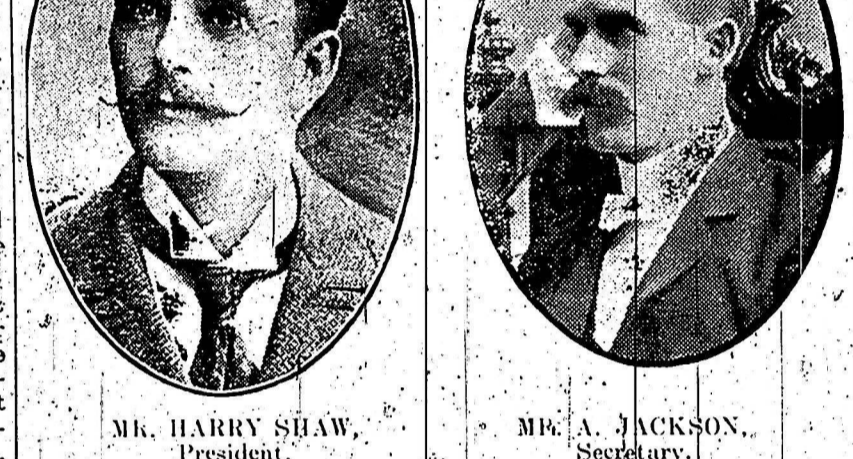
## FINE WEATHER, LARGE CROWDS MARKDALE'S BIGGEST FAIR

Exhibits in All Classes the Largest in the History of the  
Association.—Horse Races Keenly Contested.—  
Gate Receipts \$525.00; Concert \$250.00.

Gloriously bright warm weather favored the directors of the Markdale Fair this year, and before this issue gets into the hands of many of our subscribers, this annual exhibition will be a thing of the past. The weather on Wednesday was so inviting that the largest crowd in the history of the Society attended and enjoyed to the fullest the sights of the splendid exhibits in the hall and on the grounds, and also the races. The Fair this year can be said to surpass the best of former years by a long way. The entries for all classes of stock and farm produce are away ahead of all former years, and there is a marked improvement in the finish and handling of the different breeds offered for exhibition.

The pupils of the public school paraded to the grounds at one o'clock, headed by the Rockley Band. On arrival at the grounds Hon. T. S. Sproule, Speaker of the House of Commons, formally opened the Fair by a short address.

The beautiful grounds were divided into various sections for the judging of the different classes, thus distributing the crowd over the thirteen acre park, and permitting the judging of several classes to go on simultaneously. The Markdale Driving Club pulled off their

matinee at the same time. In this way excellent progress was made and the jam which would have been caused by the concentration of the vast concourse of people was obviated.

The 250 feet of shed room which had recently been provided, was only about half large enough to accommodate the scores of animals on exhibition. The show of horses and cattle was simply magnificent, as also the pigs and sheep. In poultry the exhibit was scarcely up to that of former years.

The spacious and well lighted new armory building makes an ideal agricultural hall, where every class was tastily displayed. Here the quantity in some lines was a surprise to even those accustomed to attending local fairs. In the Ladies' Work alone over five hundred entries were made. This department was the admiration of hundreds of the fair sex, and even many of the gentlemen, some of whom are acknowledged experts in fine arts and needle work. In floriculture the exhibit was large and fine. In both Canned Fruit and Bread and Pastry a most tempting display greeted the eyes of the multitude. The judges here must have been put to a test in determining upon what exhibit to attach the red and blue tickets.

A large and superior display of butter was shown. There was a good show of fruit, though not equal to that of some former years, this being an off season for fruit. In roots, though the dry season had its adverse effect, and while the quantity was generous the quality was lacking. A monster squash grown and exhibited by Mr. William Ellis, of Goring, which weighs 168 pounds was admired generally. It's eighteen pounds heavier than the prize squash at Owen Sound Fair, over which the papers did so much tooting. Some fine samples of grain were on exhibit, and the quality was superior. Mr. Kentner had a very creditable exhibit of photographs, and the Markdale Furniture Company showed a fine range of furniture, a real credit to the local factory. Mr. J. H. Stephenson had a display of pianos, also Edison Phonographs, which latter furnished excellent music during the day. Mr. Hugh Knott had also musical instruments, and Mr. Johnson Lucas Victor Victrolas, from which music both sacred and sentimental was produced without stint.
