# Impressions of a Trip Through Grey County

(Continued from page 1.)

county quite a different situation prevails. Fodder crops were the shortest in years, and farmers will experience great difficulty in holding over their stock and in fattening their marketable animals. Grey is not a dairy section. There are only two creameries in the county and these are having a struggle for existence.

Plenty of Sheep.

Sheep are considered a necessity on every Grey County farm. There are many stony fields and rough hillsides in which sheep delight to gambol and which are useful for no other purpose. It is safe to say that many more sheep should be pastured to advantage on many farms. Shropshires seem to be the favorite breed. They are good grazers and are hardy and seem suitable to Grey County. Roadside weeds and dirty fence corners are features noticeable by their absence in Grey County.

Picturesque Scenery.

There are few places in Ontario possessing a more picturesque landscape than Grey County. Driving eastward from Markdale the Kimberley Valley is reached. From the summit of the banks of this deep ravine one can see clean up the valley as far as Thornbury, a distance of sixteen miles. A winding, rocky way curves down the rocky hillside, and at the bottom of the ravine the little Beaver River trickles onward to the lake. Down in this valley, securely sheltered from the wind and cold are many beautiful farms and farm homes. Here, "far from the madding crowd's ignoble strife," these people graze a few sheep and cattle on the slopes, and are able to make a comfortable living.

Asked one man how he happened to locate in this rocky ravine. He said he had been there since 1851. His father had bought the farm without seeing it, when the country was new, and so they had been there ever since. Many of the farms are literally covered with boulders, and some of the farmers have become disheartened and deserted their farms. One hundred acres can be bought in this valley at from \$500 to \$3,000.

Some Wonderful Possibilities.

The Kimberley Valley holds wonderful possibilities as a fruit-growing centre. H. C. Duff says they can grow the finest quality Spy apple in this valley that he has ever seen. There are about 20,000 acres suitable for orchard plantations. One thriving orchard was seen by the writer which seemed to be literally growing on rock. Plums, cherries and small fruits do well also.

The whole trouble is lack of transportation facilities. There is just a possibility this may be overcome in the future. At Eugenia the Beaver River falls about 80 feet. A company in Owen Sound have commenced a power scheme, and lately the Hydro-Electric have been negotiating to take it over. The next step will be an electric line up the valley; then will \$500 farms take a big jump in value.

One man near Thornbury has an orchard in this valley which he will not sell for \$5,000. He bought it three years ago for \$3,500. The climate is so tempered that corn can be matured for seed, and all like and clover seeds do exceptionally well.

Are Not Grumbling.

Farmers in Grey County are not grumbling over conditions. It is true they have to work very hard and that they do not receive adequate returns for their labor, but the impression seems to be abroad that better times are in store for them. Although farms are offered for sale, yet land is steadily advancing in price. A good hundred acres with suitable buildings cannot be bought around Markdale for less than \$7,500, and many farmers are asking \$10,000 to \$12,000.

Few farms are now changing hands, and the movement westward seems to be a thing of the past. Farmers all seem to be wide awake and keeping a close watch on economic developments, and
