Tomb in Which He Is Said to Have Been Buried:

The site of Ninevch is almost perfectly level; but adjoining the western wall are two huge mounds that conceal the palaces of the greatest kings of Nineveh. On the lower, or southern, mound stand a mosque and a village of considerable size, says a correspondent of the Chris-



Sift flour with the salt, sugar, cream of tartar soda, and nutmeg. Beat the egg and add it to the milk. Work the butter into the sifted ingredients and then add the milk and egg. Roll out one-half inch thick, cut out with a doughnut cutter, and fry in deep fat.


