**This Inquisitive Aunt**

is Liable to Imprisonment.—Penalty For Unlawfully Opening Letters.

(Legal Dept. in Mail & Empire)

Qu.—A maiden aunt and her niece both have the same name and live in the same house. The aunt gets her niece's letters, and, although she knows the letters are not for her, yet she opens them, and claims that she has a right to do so, because the letters are addressed to her name and place of abode. Has she a legal right to do so? (2) Can she be prosecuted for opening letters which she knows by the writing and postmark are not intended for her?

Ans.—The aunt should not open the letters of her niece. The Post-office Act says: "Everyone who unlawfully opens, etc., any post letter, whether the same come into the possession of the offender by finding or otherwise, is guilty of an indictable offence, and may be punished accordingly." The Criminal Code says: "Everyone who is summarily convicted of any offence for which the punishment is specially provided shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$50, or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, or both." The aunt's inquisitiveness may get her into trouble. (2) A person who opens a letter by mistake will be excused, but a person who knowingly opens a letter that is intended for another is guilty of an offence under section 366 of the Criminal Code.

**A School Teacher's Enterprise**

One of the most interesting letters recently received by the Dairy Commissioner, Ottawa, is from a school teacher in Alberta who asks for milk record forms and literature on the subject of Cow Testing because—now listen: Some of the boys in the school are starting a contest in recording the production of individual cows to last one year. This opens up a most promising field for every school teacher and for thousands of boys in our country schools. In this we would be following somewhat slowly in the wake of many schools in the United States and New Zealand where the use of the Babcock milk tester has been taught for some time. In a dairy country like this, we should be out blazing trails for other teachers and boys to follow. No better work could be taken up by such lads, for any record work of that kind must infallibly lead to better, vastly better, conditions on dairy farms. Probably these Alberta lads will soon be excellent dairymen obtaining seventy-five or one hundred dollars per cow. Needless to say the Dairy Division will be only too ready to supply blank forms and instructions in all such cases.
