\$24.36 PER H.P.**HYDRO RATE FOR
MARKDALE**

On Nov. 27th the Markdale Council asked the Hydro-Electric Commission for a quotation on the cost of supplying this town with electricity for light and power purposes. The following reply has been received:

To the Municipal Council of the Village of Markdale:

Replies to a request from your Council a short time ago in connection with the cost of serving Markdale with 150 H.P. from the Eugenia Falls Power Development, we beg to advise that we have estimated that the above amount of power can be delivered to your village for \$24.36 per H.P.

The reasonable rate quoted herein will no doubt be very gratifying to the citizens of Markdale. To give some idea of how this rate compares with that of other portions of the province we give the following table:

Thus it will be seen that Markdale will have a lower rate than the city of St. Thomas, for instance, where thousands of horse power are used.

Work has already begun at Eugenia Falls, and a number of engineers are engaged in surveying storage limits, locating dams, etc.

Mrs. R. C. Bryden**

Widow of Markdale's First Town Clerk Passes Away in Toronto At Advanced Age.

Those who still survive and were residents of Markdale from 22 to 40 years ago have nothing but kindly memories of Mrs. Bryden. She passed away in Toronto on Thursday last, to her long home, aged 85 years. Shortly after her husband's death, which took place 22 years ago last March, deceased went to Toronto to reside with her daughter, Teenie (Mrs. McGill), where she spent all these years. A stroke which she received over two months ago was the immediate cause of death. The remains were brought on Friday by C.P.R. accompanied by her two daughters, Mrs. Nichol, of Owen Sound, who had been with her mother through her late illness, and Mrs. McGill, together with Mr. McGill, the casket, which was covered with floral offerings, rested a couple of hours at the home of Mrs. Hollingshead, a much esteemed friend of deceased, after which interment took place by the remains of her deceased husband in Markdale Public Cemetery, Rev. R. M. Phalen officiating at the house and grave.

Messrs. Wm. Lucas, S. J. Herbert, Thos. Mathews, Angus Plewes, Hugh Mercer and C. W. Butcher acted as pall bearers. Four children survive, Frank, of Chetwynd; Andrew, Blairmore, Alta.; Mrs. Mark Creaser, of Owen Sound, and Mrs. McGill, of Toronto. Mr. Mark Creaser was also present at the funeral. The late R. C. Bryden was Markdale's first town clerk, and was a most capable official.
