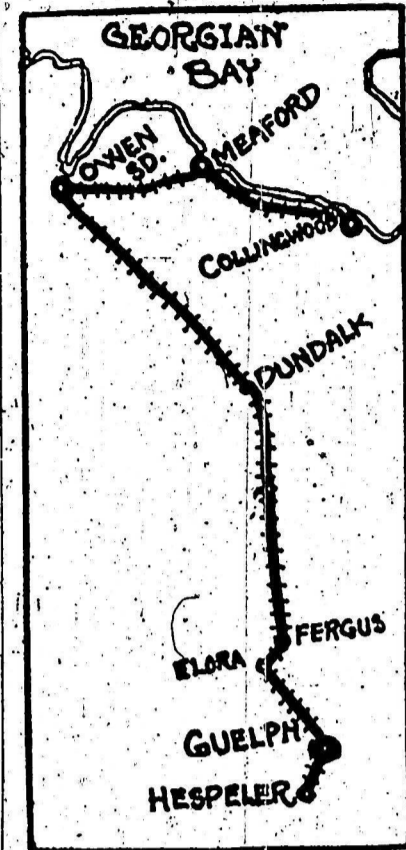
Farmers' Meetings.

Where Will Hydro Radial Run?

Much Conjecture as to Probable Route of Electric Line from Guelph to Georgian Bay

There is much conjecture as to where the hydro electric railway from Guelph north to the Georgian Bay will run and through what territory it will pass, but of course it is absolutely impossible to say which districts will be touched by



the line until the report is made by the engineers who will soon make a survey of the country and advise as to the most feasible route. In the accompanying map, the artist has sketched out a route running from Hespeler northward through Guelph, Elora and Fergus then straight north through Dufferin County, parallel with the C.P.R. to Owen Sound and east to Meaford and Collingwood. This route is highly improbable, not only on account of the hilly nature of some of the country through which it would pass, but also because the points touched are now fairly well served by railways. The route that is looked on as a possible one would pass north from Guelph, through Elora, Fergus and Arthur to Markdale and Flesherston, probably running close to Eugenia Falls and continuing on through the rich Beaver River valley to Thornbury and Meaford through Artemesia and Euphrasia and westward to Owen Sound. This route would tap a fertile and rich country unserved by any railway, besides giving a direct road to Guelph and giving Owen Sound a connection with Meaford.

As we said before, however, the whole matter rests on the finding of the engineers who will go over the country, and until their report is made, it is impossible to say which towns and districts will be passed by and which will be linked up. There is no doubt that the construction of an electric line from Guelph to the Georgian Bay, wherever it will run, will only be the beginning of a network of radial lines which will connect the whole of this northern portion of the Province.—O.S. Sun.

No Election in Markdale

 by Alderman J. Arley, Chairman of Streets and Sidewalks; Alderman A. L. Walker, Chairman of Parks and Cemetery Com., and by Messrs. W. J. Bowes, J. E. Walker and J. G. McDuff.
 After the above the trustees nominees were called upon, when Messrs. Knott, Rutledge, Purvis and Pickell briefly addressed the meeting.
 This was followed by a report of the delegation to Guelph for the proposed Electric Radial Railway from Guelph to Owen Sound. Messrs. M. Armstrong and C. W. Rutledge explained the object of the banquet and gathering at Guelph. The municipalities all along the proposed route have taken the only step necessary thus far, viz: to formally request the Hydro Commission to make surveys and fully investigate the cost per mile of a line or lines through the proposed district, and prepare an estimate of the same, together with an estimate of revenue from such a line. This the Commission is now working on, and when complete the feasibility of the proposition will be discussed publicly, and if found practicable will be voted on. It is the proposition for the people. If the ratepayers think well of it, after they are put in possession of the result of careful investigation by the Commission experts, it will rest with them to say whether or not there will be a radial line through their district. Such a line is expected to pay for itself in the course of a term of years, but in the mean time each municipality will be required to become responsible for the funds with which to build and equip the road, and in case the revenue should fall short of meeting the payments of principal and interest on the debentures, then the municipalities interested would be called upon to make good the discrepancy. A proposed line direct from Guelph to Owen Sound with branches say from Dundalk to Collingwood, from Flesherston to Thornbury, and from Walters Falls to Meaford would look all right on a map.

He's Major Now.

Notice appeared in the last issue of the Canadian Gazette of the promotion of Capt. G. F. McFarland, formerly of Markdale, now of Toronto, to Major of the Thirty-First Regiment, while Major Chisholm, of Owen Sound, has been appointed Colonel, succeeding Colonel Chisholm, of Meaford, who is one of the most enthusiastic militiamen of the district, and whose loss to the regiment will be greatly felt. At camp Col. Chisholm has got "in right" with the boys and it would indeed have been found a more popular successor to Col. Clelland, Major H. V. Korke, of Ottawa, succeeds Lt. Col. Chisholm as second in command of the regiment, and Major McFarland takes Major Korke's position as Junior Major. Capt. Jaffray Eaton becomes Adjutant, vice Major McFarland. Capt. Campbell, of Markdale, has now attained the rank of Senior Captain of the Regiment.

 Artemesia Agricultural Society was granted \$30.00 for 1912-13, and East Grey Agricultural Society \$15 for 1913.
 A large number of claims for sheep killed by dogs, and also accounts for various matters, were ordered to be paid.

Brown—McLeod—That the matter complained of by W. C. Wilcox as to obstructions placed on the town line by J. M. Davis, Mr. Graham is hereby appointed to meet a representative of Euphrasia Council to investigate and report thereon.
 McLeod—Graham—That the application of C. E. Watson for compensation for timber alleged to be burned by fire from highway be not entertained, as this Council is not in any way responsible.—Carried.
 Graham—Caswell—That Mr. McLeod having signified his intention to this Council of not seeking re-election, we desire to express our regret for such action and express our appreciation of his services for the past three years, realizing his agreeable association with us and his earnest endeavors to conduct the business of municipality in an able and efficient manner.—Carried.
 Brown—Caswell—That the thanks of the members of this Council are hereby extended to the Reeve, Mr. T. R. McKenzie, for the able and important manner in which he has presided at the meetings for the year now about closing, and also for the efficient manner in which he has discharged the duties of the office during his incumbency.
 This motion was put by Mr. Graham and carried unanimously, after which the Council adjourned sine die.—Advance.
