It would have the effect of placing all cities and towns on an even basis; and there would not be that reckless bidding for industries in the way of free sites, fixed assessment, or tax exemptions. ## DUNDALK

Dundalk Council for 1914 consists of Mr. John Sinclair, Reeve, Messrs. A. E. Colgan, W. C. Armstrong, W. J. Russell and F. V. Bellamy.

Rev. Geo. Kendall, of Dromore, has signified his intention to accept the unanimous call extended to him by the Presbyterian congregations of Dundalk and Ventry.

At the request of Dundalk Board of Trade the Railway Commission of Canada, sent a man here a couple of weeks ago to inspect and report on dangerous railway crossings in the village. His report and recommendations now come from the Secretary of the Commission to the Village Clerk, Hillyer showing that the C.P.R. will be asked to install an illuminated electric bell at the Main Street crossing and so on at the Victoria Ave. crossing. It is also recommended that Holland Street, leading to the grain elevators from Proton Street be closed.—Herald.

Sir James Grows Weaker End Thought to be Near  
Although Premier Spent a Fairly Quiet Night, No Improvement Is Shown.

Tuesday's Bulletin.  
"Sir James Whitney's condition is not improved, although he had a fairly quiet night. "He seems rather weaker than yesterday."

New York, Jan. 13.—The inability of Sir James Whitney to recover the strength he lost in the rupture that he suffered on Sunday, and the announcement from the sick room at the Manhattan Hotel this morning that he was weaker, gave rise to the inference that the Premier had perhaps entered upon a phase of the heart which would result in a fatal termination.

Sir James was able to sleep last night, but his rest was of a fitful character, and did not for more than an hour at any time enable him to fight off the restlessness that had attacked him, while none of the ground he lost Sunday and yesterday was retaken.

This morning, despite his weakened condition, the Premier was able to take nourishment, and apparently relished it. The strength that would result from it, however, it was believed, would only enable him to survive for a few days, unless a very material improvement manifested itself.

GRADUALLY FAILING.  
Asked if Sir James' condition had not shown a gradual retrogression since Sunday, Hon. Dr. P. S. P. the Premier's political colleague and medical adviser, this morning answered in the affirmative.

In reply to the definite question: "Will Sir James last a week under the present circumstances?" Dr. P. S. P. remarked: "He might, we cannot tell. If no particular exertion is imposed upon him, his tremendous vitality and physical strength might carry him along for quite a while."

STILL HOLDS OUT HOPE.  
When the fact that the bulletins were giving rise to pessimism was pointed out to Hon. Dr. P. S. P., he acknowledged that it was warranted, but added that he had not given up hope.

On Saturday and yesterday it had been hoped by Dr. P. S. P. and Dr. Hermann Biggs, the local specialist in attendance, that it would be possible to remove Sir James to Toronto in the special car kept waiting in the New York Central yards for that purpose, but the serious development in the Prime Minister's condition checkmated this. Dr. P. S. P. said that to move Sir James at the present juncture would cause his death.

## Won Suit for \$500 Damages

His Honor Judge Sutherland, on Tuesday, gave judgment for \$500 and costs in favor of the plaintiffs in the case of Artley Bros. vs. the Township of Sydenham.

The action arose out of an accident which happened on Oct. 13th, 1913, when a threshing outfit, consisting of a traction engine and separator, went through McClurg's bridge in Sydenham. Besides the damage to the machines, David Artley (who is a nephew of Mr. Jeffrey Artley of Markdale) was seriously injured and spent some weeks in the hospital with an injured leg.

Artley Bros. then sued for \$500 damages, alleging that there had been negligence on the part of the township in not having the bridge in a proper state of repair.

The case was heard before Judge Sutherland Monday and Tuesday, Dec. 22 and 23, but judgment was not given until this week. Messrs. Middlemore and Sperman were the plaintiffs' solicitors, while Messrs. Wright, Telford and McDonald appeared in the interests of the municipality.
