It may not be generally known  
that under the Tree Planting Act  
of the Province of Ontario, trees  
planted on the public highways be-  
come the property of the owners of  
the land adjacent to the highway.  
Hence, telephone, telegraph or electric  
companies or persons destroy-  
ing or injuring such trees, without  
the owner's consent, are liable to  
fine or imprisonment.

The practice of bonusing manu-  
facturers, in any form by municipali-
