

OPENING OF PARLIAMENT

Governor General's Speech Referred to Matters of Interest to the Dominion.

A despatch from Ottawa says: The opening of Parliament on Thursday was characterized with institutional procedure carried out with the greatest exactitude and fidelity to detail. The Duke came up from Rideau Hall escorted by a squadron of dragoons, was received by a guard of honor and saluted by twenty-one guns from the battery at Nepean Point.

The Senate Chamber was thronged with officials of many cities. Everyone stood when his Royal Highness entered, accompanied by the Princess Patricia and attended by a brilliant military suite. The Commons, meanwhile, had assembled down in their chamber, and waited the summons to go higher.

Speech From The Throne.

The speech from the throne was read by His Royal Highness in the following terms:

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I take this public opportunity of expressing to you all my deep sense of gratitude for the comfort and support that were afforded me at the time of the serious illness of the Duchess of Connaught by the numerous messages of sympathy that were received from Canada, and by the knowledge that the hearts of so many Canadians were with us during those dark days. I can only regret that my enforced absence made it impossible for me to fully exercise the duties of my high office during a considerable portion of last year.

It gives me great pleasure to be able to congratulate you upon the remarkable expansion of Canada's trade with other countries in the past fiscal year, during which our total trade far exceeded that of any preceding year.

Harvesting of Crops.

The bountiful crops which the Dominion has fortunately been blessed during the past season have been harvested under unusually favorable conditions, which have enabled the transportation companies to make full use of all the facilities at their disposal. Thus the difficulties which, sometimes arose in former years, have not been manifest, and an unusually large proportion of the crops have been conveyed to the seaboard before the close of the season of navigation.

Canada has been favored by a long series of prosperous years and although at the present moment business is slightly restricted by the financial stringency which prevails throughout the world, I feel convinced that this condition will be merely temporary, and that the boundless resources of this Dominion which are so fully and universally known and recognized, give us the fullest assurance of continued material prosperity and progress.

Redistribution Heralded.

As a result of the recent general census the representation of the different provinces must be readjusted, as required by the British North American Act and a bill will be introduced for that purpose.

A bill to amend the Rail-

way Act and its various amendments as well as bills relating to the civil service and to trust and loan companies will be submitted for your consideration.

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STORMS IN FRANCE.

Soldiers Assigned to Dig Out Snow-bound Trains.

A despatch from Paris says: The continued cold throughout France, with heavy snowfalls, is becoming a national calamity. The first train in three days between France and Spain got through to Cerbere on Monday, but more than 20 other provincial lines are completely out of service. The Minister of War has authorized the commanders of the garrisons to utilize the troops digging out snowbound trains.

London Lawyer Misappropriated Clients' Funds.

A despatch from London, Ont., says: Five years in Kingston Penitentiary was the sentence handed Thomas W. Luscombe on Monday morning by Judge Elliott on charges of theft and misappropriation of funds entrusted to his care. Luscombe for years was one of the best known barristers in this city. In passing sentence Judge Elliott said he would like to be lenient, but felt that a severe punishment was necessary because of the high standing of the members of the legal profession in London and throughout the province.

SIX MEN KILLED.

Premature Explosion on C.N.R. Construction Work.

A despatch from Ottawa says: Six men were killed and three others seriously injured in a dynamite explosion late Saturday at the C.N.R. construction work at Ross' Point, Quebec, opposite Arnprior.

The names of the dead so far as

is known are: Jos. Elliott, aged 22, single; Bristol Mines; Stephen J. Trudeau, aged 22, wife and three children, Bristol Mines; Duncan Herron, aged 35, married, no children, Bristol Mines. The other three are foreigners.

BOYS SHOT \$5,000 FOX.

Heavy Loss Sustained by Concern Near Village of Wyoming.

A despatch from Wyoming, Ont., says: A valuable female blood fox, the property of A. L. Barloway and Sons, of this village, was shot only Alvinston by a couple of boys, who had no idea of the value of the animal. The fox was said to be worth \$5,000, and a reward of \$200 had been offered by the owners for its recovery. It had been missing since last fall.

NOTED FINANCIER DEAD.

Hon. George A. Cox Passed Away in His 74th Year.

A despatch from Toronto says: Senator George A. Cox, for years one of the greatest financiers in Canada, and always a citizen of whom the Dominion was justly proud, died just before daybreak on Friday morning at his home in Sherbourne Street after an illness of nearly a year. He was in the 74th year of his age. Senator Cox's condition had been gradually growing worse during the past few weeks in spite of every assistance it was possible for three eminent physicians to render him, and during the last few days he had for the major portion of the time been lying in a state-of-coma, only his remarkable vitality keeping the spark of life within his body. Death was due to arterial sclerosis, or hardening of the arteries. The family were at the bedside when the end came.


