Local and General

Parcel Post in Operation

Names of Postal Stations Within 20-Mile Zone from Markdale.—Parcels Now Mailed for Little Money.

The postal stations inside two miles from Markdale are now being determined upon. A list has been prepared and proves of interest in regard to the parcel post system. Regarding the 20 mile zone the regulations state that the rates will be as follows in Ontario:

However, during February, March and April only six pounds will be accepted by the new system and so the last five rates will be dormant during that period.

The system used in determining the 20-mile zone was to take a large map with a plain scale and draw a twenty mile radius. Every point has not been authentically determined, but in the main they are all within the radius. The list is as follows:
