That there is nothing new under the sun receives fresh proof every day from the work of scientists. Mr. W. H. Cadman has recently discovered, that the Egyptians incubated chickens to the number of one hundred and twenty millions a year. He has, further, found out how they did it. They had no oilstoves or gas or electrically-heated incubators, but used ovens which worked much better, though they required a little more attending to. Each oven was made to hold seven thousand eggs, and the fuel used was chopped straw, until the last ten days, when the hatching energy was supplied by the chickens themselves. One of the commonest errors of the men using our modern incubators is to employ far too much heat, especially towards the end of the period. It seems, therefore, that we may learn not only how to do things but, also, how not to do them from the Egyptians of five thousand years ago. The fact that they used straw shows that they were most careful to avoid intense heat at any stage in the proceedings.

The romantic career of the Coats family, the thread millionaires, has been running to its end with the death of no fewer than five members during the last two years. Eacel member has left a large fortune through which the British exchequer has been enriched by a total of some \$6,000,000.
