### Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 21 years of age may acquire a quarter section of available Dominion land in the Northwest Territory, provided that the applicant must appear in person at the District Office of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, to receive a certificate of title. ### FISHING REGULATIONS

United States Senate Passes Bill After Long Delay. A despatch from Washington says: The Senate on Friday passed a bill to put into effect January 1, 1915, the fishing regulations recommended by the Joint Fishery Commission of the United States and Canada for boundary waters. The Canadian Government had notified the United States that it would not consider itself bound to the regulations if the United States had not acted by March 1. The Canadian Government, however, approved the regulations about three years ago.

## THE HARBOR OF MONTREAL

### The Commissioners Expect to Spend Fifteen Million Dollars in Four Years

A despatch from Montreal says: In their first declaration of policy since their appointment two years ago the Montreal Harbor Commissioners on Thursday morning outlined the plans for improvement of the harbor and terminal facilities which they contemplate, and on which they plan to spend \$15,000,000 within the next four years. This year the Harbor Commissioners will spend \$3,500,000 on the development of the port. The chief work will include the construction of two new freight and transportation sheds to accommodate the Hamburg-American and Canadian Northern weekly services; the electrification of the entire system of harbor railways; the elevation of the railway tracks between McGill Street and Victoria Pier, and the erection of a new mammoth warehouse at the foot of Moran Street, besides another at the foot of Beaudry Street.

## THE SUNDAY SCHOOL STUDY

### INTERNATIONAL LESSON, MARCH 8.

Lesson X. Watchfulness (Temperature Lesson)—Luke 12: 35-43. Golden Text, Luke 12: 37.

Verse 35. Girded.—The long flowing gowns formerly worn by Jews impeded movement. In preparing for work or for rapid traveling the wearer drew them close about the waist and fastened them with a sash.

Lamps burning.—This suggests the parable of the ten virgins (see Matt. 25: 1-13).

36. When he shall return from the marriage feast.—The master of the house has been invited to attend the marriage of a friend. At the wedding festivities usually lasted a week, the servants would be left alone for some time. The parallel passage in Mark mentions the master's sojourn in another country (Mark 13: 34).

37. He shall gird himself, and make them sit down to meat, and shall come and serve them.—This is the inversion of the relation of master and servants, the lord doing the work of a slave in gratitude for the servants' faithfulness. This is a type of what is promised at the Marriage Supper of the Lamb (See Rev. 19: 9). The usual course between master and servant is given in Luke 17: 7-10.

38. In the second watch, and in the third.—The Romans divided the night into four watches, the Jews into three. Jesus probably refers to the Jewish division, that is, twelve to three and three to six o'clock.

39. A second illustration to show the need of watchfulness. Know this.—The verb is probably indicative and would therefore mean, "You know this."

He would have watched, and not have left his house to be broken through.—Except among the rich, whose houses were sometimes built of stone, the walls were of adobe, or sun-dried bricks, and would be easily "broken," or "dug through."

40. In an hour that ye think not the Son of man cometh.—Since the Son of man may come unexpectedly, it behooves all disciples to be watchful. It is sometimes well to ask ourselves at the close of the day if the time has been spent as we would like it to have spent it were that day our last.

41. This verse gives another illustration of Peter's impulsiveness and his acting as spokesman for the twelve. Peter doubtless has in mind the promise given in verse 37, and wishes to know whether this high privilege is offered to all or reserved for the apostles alone. Compare Mark 13: 37.

42. As was often his custom, Jesus answered Peter's question by asking another. He does not tell what he wished to know, but led each one who heard him to recognize that he was a steward with responsibilities.

"Their portion of food in due season."—The upper servants, or stewards, on Roman estates served out at regular intervals the food apportioned to the lower servants. 43. So doings.—Serving the others, that is, doing his work faithfully.

44. He will set him over all that he hath.—Increased responsibility, not release, is the reward for faithfulness. Compare the parable of the pounds, in which the servant who was found faithful in a very little, was given authority over much (Luke 16: 17).

45. To eat and drink, and to be drunken.—This servant was probably dissipating on what should have been given to the servants under him.

46. Shall cut him asunder, and appoint him his portion with the unfaithful.—Unfaithful servants, that is, those who abused their trust, were punished with violent death.

47. Note the gradation of punishment shown in this parable, namely, violent death for gross evil doing; many stripes for willful neglect of duty; few stripes for unconscious neglect, since the servant may be in a measure responsible for not having found out his lord's will. Luke 10: 12-14 also suggests degrees of punishment.

48. To whomsoever much is given, of him shall much be required.—The principle is the same as that stated in the talents and the pounds. See also comment on verse 44.

## Our London Letter

The Queen Obscure New Fashions. Queen Mary has been accepting many of fashion's innovations of late after pursuing her own line unconcernedly for some time. Her new ensembles show no superfluous width, and lately she has been wearing her hair dressed in much more fashionable style.
