Parcel Post Up to Limit

The sign of spring is here, as the crows are showing themselves, and Misses W. Brett and G. Fothergill saw a robin on Tuesday morning.

James Hogg, pioneer resident of Melancthon township, passed away in Orangeville on Monday at the age of eighty-seven years. The remains were brought to Dundalk on Wednesday by C.P.R., and the funeral took place that afternoon from the home of Mr. John Rath, west of the village, to Dundalk cemetery.

The clerk of the village of Flesherton has received from the commission an estimate of the cost of power to be delivered there. There are three groupings and the price is different under each grouping. The cost of power will therefore be dependent upon what other municipalities come into the combination, and is based as follows:

With Eugenia, Dundalk, Flesherton, Hanover, Walkerton, Markdale, Chatsworth and Owen Sound in one group the cost would be \$27.41 per horsepower.

With Owen Sound, Shallow Lake, Flesherton, Dundalk, Durham, Hanover, Walkerton, Markdale, and Chatsworth in a group the price would be \$26.05.

With Owen Sound, Chatsworth, Markdale, Flesherton and Dundalk in a group the price would be \$30.05.

These prices, however, are based on the ridiculously small estimate of only fifty horsepower. No other municipality is shown here and Owen Sound asked for so small an amount, and no doubt the actual horsepower used would be much larger, with a corresponding decrease in the proportionate cost of power.

Officers of the commission say that every contingency will be met at Eugenia. They will be able to deliver all the power for which they may contract, be the seasons wet or dry. With the storage dams to be erected this summer they will be able to control sufficient water to make them independent of dry seasons, even for two dry years in succession.
