In His 103rd Year.

Death of Old Resident of Euphrasia.—John Henning Passes Away on Sunday Evening.

Mr. John Henning, of Euphrasia, by far the oldest resident of these parts, passed away at his home at Beaverdale on Sunday evening, aged 102 years.

Mr. Henning was born in the month of January, in the year 1812. His birthplace was near Newry, in County Down, Ireland, where his father, Samuel Henning, was a farmer.

Mr. Henning had an exceedingly clear memory, and could relate circumstances connected with the war with Napoleon. He often recalled the sensation occasioned in his home by the enforced absence of his father who in order to release other men for the field at Waterloo, was obliged to join the yeomanry.

When 16 or 17 years of age he joined the Orange Order, so that he was an Orangeman of over eighty years standing. At the age of 19 he left home to seek his fortune, and worked for several years in England and Scotland.

On coming to Canada Mr. Henning settled first in Simcoe County, near the site of the present town of Alliston. Later he came to Euphrasia, which then was a forest wilderness.

His wife, who died some fifteen years ago, shared all his pioneer experiences in this new land. Her maiden name was Fitzsimmons, and they were married in County Down by Rev. Mr. Burnside, a minister of the Presbyterian Church, of which deceased was a member.

Nine children survive, viz: Mrs. Nixon, Thornbury; Mrs. D. Ferris, Collingwood; Mrs. G. Lippard, Proton; Mrs. W. Irwin and Mrs. A. Ormsby, Euphrasia; Samuel, Proton; Alex., Artemesia; and John and James, of Euphrasia.

The funeral took place to Temple Hill Cemetery on Tuesday, Rev. Mr. Beveridge officiating. The pall bearers were six grandsons of the deceased.

The Council met April 3rd, pursuant to adjournment; All members present, Reeve in the chair, minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications from J. C. Ross and H. J. Armstrong, re Traverston Bridge, were read; also from John J. Bennett, claim for damage to buggy; from Thos. H. Binnie, asking for Grant to Farmers' Club.

Several others, from money lenders, good roads people and Hydro Electric promoters were read and ordered to be filed. Also a petition from W. L. Young and 30 others praying that the Council open a part of sidewalk between Lots 25 and 26, Cons. 7 and 8.

Peart—McMillan—In Amendment that a committee of the whole council meet at Lots 25 and 26, Cons. 7 and 8, on May 1st, to investigate the road there.—Carried.

Young—Lindsay—That Charles Mortley be paid \$7.50 to pay expenses to Toronto as a delegate to the meeting of the Hydro Electric Commission there.—Carried.

Lindsay—McMillan—That the Municipal World be paid \$6.56, for office supplies for the Clerk.—Carried.

McMillan—Peart—That the Farmer's Club have the use of the hall for their meetings of 1914 at \$6.00.—Carried.

Lindsay—McMillan—That Robert McMillan be paid \$3.50 for work with team at lot 3, con. 3, N.D.R.—Carried.

Peart—Lindsay—That the Assessor be paid \$800 on salary.—Carried.

Lindsay—McMillan—That Emerson Peart be paid \$1000 for team hauling planks.—Carried.

McMillan—Young—That Arthur Greenwood be refunded \$5.51, being on account of an error on Roll in 1912.—Carried.

Lindsay—McMillan—That the Municipal World be paid 85 cents for forms for Municipal returns.—Carried.

McMillan—Lindsay—That the Clerk be paid \$40 on salary.

Young—Peart—That the Clerk notify Dan McAuliff the error in assessment in 1912.—Carried.

The Council adjourned to May 2nd at 10 a.m.

Further Restrictions on the Liquor Traffic.

Amendments introduced into the Legislature on Monday will strengthen the provincial liquor license administration. Some of the amendments are as follows:

The right to question an intoxicated person in local option districts will hereafter be allowed in any "dry" district, and he may be forced to explain the circumstances.

It is now left to the magistrate to place on the Indian list any person he thinks fit, the clause being

designed to help out relatives who would urge the treatment, but are backward about it.

Druggists as well as licensees will have the privilege of appealing from convictions and the fines and penalties accumulating in local option districts will be placed in a common fund for the constituency to expedite its administration.

It is also made that on Christmas Day, as well as on Good Friday, all public houses must be closed.

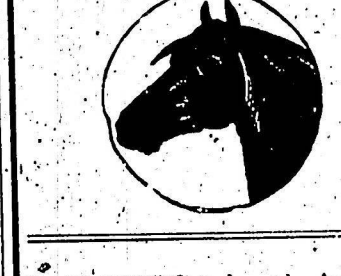
