That John Morley, the author of wonderful biographical and critical studies of Voltaire, Diderot, and Rousseau, should now be Lord Morley of Blackburn is itself almost a miracle. That he should have been, even temporarily, leader of the House of Lords, as was the case during Lord Crewe's illness, is super-miraculous. John Morley, the son of a surgeon, was born at Blackburn on December 24, 1838. He was educated at Cheltenham College and at Lincoln College, Oxford. He has edited the Fortnightly Review and the Pall Mall Gazette. He was M.P. for Newcastle-on-Tyne from 1883 to 1895, and for Montrose Burghs from 1895 to 1898, when he entered the House of Lords as Viscount Morley of Blackburn. Lord Morley is a master of literary influence. Later books include his great "Life of Gladstone," "The Life of Richard Cobden," and a study of Oliver Cromwell. As an essayist he has covered a wide range, and achieved some memorable phrases.—London Sketch.

born April 14, 1874, married 1904

to Royal Highness Princess Alice of Albany, daughter of the late

Prince Leopold, Duke of Albany, youngest son of Queen Victoria.

Princess Rupert Alexander George Augustus, born Aug. 24, 1907.
