Geo. G. Alberry Liberal Choice

Convention at Clarksburg on Tuesday Unanimously Chose: Meaford Lawyer.
 At the Liberal Convention in Clarksburg, on Tuesday, Mr. Geo. G. Alberry, lawyer, of Meaford, was unanimously chosen as the Liberal Candidate to contest the riding of Centre Grey in the Provincial Election on June 29th.

Improving the Roads.

The Council has decided to spend some money on improving the roads leading into the town within the municipality, and to that end have secured the services of Mr. J. G. McDuff, who commenced with a gang of men at the House of Refuge on Monday morning. Considerable grading and graveling will be done and, with Mr. McDuff at the helm, it is safe to predict that what is done will be done well—that is, as far as the limited amount of capital at his disposal will allow. We understand the Council will spend probably \$500 for this purpose this year. It will be money well spent as these roads contiguous to the town have long been a disgrace to the municipality.

Bright Students.

Congratulations are being extended to those students who were successful in the examinations at Toronto University. The examinations this year are reported to have been much more difficult than those of former years in consequence of the desire to raise standards, hence "stars" were in abundance. Mr. Willard W. Henry passed in first year at the Faculty of Medicine; Mr. W. L. Cullis, of Vandeleur, secured deferred Honours in second year political science in the Faculty of Arts; Miss E. L. Bishop secured "B.L." standing in second year Mathematics; Miss G. Chantler, formerly of Markdale, passed in third year Mathematics; Miss M. R. Graham, B.A., (a granddaughter of our esteemed townsman, Mr. Ford), passed her fourth year with honours in Moderns; Mr. R. W. E. McFadden, B.A., despite the fact that about a dozen papers were written in the throes of "la grippe", was a runner-up for the Governor-General's Gold Medal, the highest award of the University, which was awarded to Mr. Erdmann Doane Beynon, B.A., son of Mr. R. B. Beynon, B.A., of Bradford. Mr. McFadden passed with honours in the honours course in Philosophy and the General Course, being one of three students in the graduate class of the University who successfully upheld two courses throughout his University career. Some significance of the extent of his studies is felt when it is observed that he has passed through his whole academic career—public and high school and University—in less than half the specified time. During the last four years he has secured standing in about one hundred papers (with no failures) and has prepared the work for 30 more, having in addition to his two courses completed the preparation of Mathematics and Science; minus laboratory work; and has only three subjects to prepare to graduate in the honours courses of English and History, (Classics and Moderns). He has a considerable acquaintance with sixteen languages and in addition to his academic work has been a college representative on the City papers, a faculty representative on the weekly for two years, and in the political arena has been twice a Cabinet Minister and Chief Whip of his party. Also, he has been an efficient hand behind some of the student organizations. Dr. J. S. McCullough, M.D., C.M., received the diploma of Public Health. Mr. N. E. McKinnon secured the eighth position in first year medicine.
