Child Dies From Burns

Three-Year-Old Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Rowe, of the Suburbs, Succumbs to Injuries Received.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Rowe was saddened on Thursday last, June 4th, when their oldest daughter, Sadie Irene, aged 3 1/2 years, was burned so severely that death resulted the following day at 11 a.m. Mr. Rowe was absent at the time; Mrs. Rowe and her brother, John Burrell, had gone to feed some calves, but were only three minutes out of the house when they noticed a fire through the window. They rushed in, only to find her darling child a mass of flames. Mrs. Rowe picked her up, endeavoring to subdue the fire. Only for the promptness of her brother, John, Mrs. Rowe would have herself also been a victim to the flames. How the fire started is a mystery. Dr. Ego was at once on hand and did all medical aid could, but in spite of all, Sadie, in a few hours succumbed to her painful injuries. The funeral on Sunday at two p.m. at Markdale Public Cemetery was largely attended. Rev. W. A. Graham, of Toronto, officiated at the house and grave. Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Rowe are a highly esteemed young couple, residing three miles from Markdale, and have the sympathy of the entire community in their sad affliction. The child we loved is now laid low. That loving little voice is still. The hand we often clasped in ours. Now lies in death's cold coil.

H. Thurston, Printing account, \$24.03; Dr. A. J. McFadden, resignation as Health Officer; Hy. Heitman, act., postage for Clerk, Louis Moore, claiming that, McFadden refused to pay their share of Green Sea ditch.

Orders were issued on the Treasurer to pay Municipal World \$1.94, Stationery, Hy. Heitman, \$5.00, Clerk's postage, Fisherton Advance, \$24.03, printing; The members of Council and Clerk and Assessor, \$2.50 each, for service on Assessment Committee; Jas. Henderson, \$15.00 each, expenses as deputations from Osprey Council to Federal Government regarding Hydro Electric Railway; also Wm. S. Inkster, A. N. Brownridge, James Plimster, J. J. Colquette, Wm. L. Taylor, Archy McIntyre, Thos. S. Freethy, Henry Spott, John S. Winters, \$15.00 each, expenses as Deputation from Osprey to Federal Government regarding Hydro Electric Railway; John Thomson, \$2.50, examining complaint re Essex drain; John Thomson and Irwin Morrison, \$5.00 each, expenses attending Hydro Electric meeting in Toronto.

The resignation of Dr. McFadden as Medical Health Officer was accepted and by-law No. 581 was passed, appointing Dr. A. E. Rosell Health Officer.

The application from S. S. No. 5 for a loan of \$2800 for 15 years at 5 1/2 per cent interest was granted, and by-law No. 580 was passed providing for the issue of Debitures for amount.

The Council fixed the price of wages to be paid by the Road Commissioners, namely: Man and team, on grader \$3.50; man and team, drawing gravel \$3; Operating grader, \$2; shovelers, \$1.50 per day, and not more than 10c per yard for gravel.

The Clerk was instructed to notify all the pathmasters that \$1.50 would be charged for each day's unperformed statute labor.
