

NEWS FROM SURROUNDING TOWNSHIPS BY STAFF REPORTERS

The Two Greys.

The redistribution bill in the house of commons has finally been made agreeable to both parties and it is through Grey county, as has been anticipated, has lost seat, that of East Grey, and will now send two members to the federal house, one from North Grey and one from South Grey. In the division of the townships and their allocation to either the north or the south riding it has for some time been recognized that the North Riding would remain as it is with the addition of the townships of Collingwood and Euphrasia. The remainder of the county will be merged into the one riding of South Grey. The passage of the bill has given rise to the anticipation of a general election this fall for the dominion, because for a time it had been deemed doubtful if the bill would go through. Now that it is accomplished the election might come at an earlier date than is generally expected, possibly even this fall. The following is the announcement with respect to Grey's division as it comes from Ottawa in a Wednesday news dispatch:

Grey county, for the Dominion House, heretofore being three members, is now divided into two ridings, each with one member. They are called the north and the southeast ridings. The north riding consists of Owen Sound, Meaford, Thornbury, Sydenham, Keppel, Derby, Sarawak, St. Vincent, Collingwood and Euphrasia. The southeast riding consists of Durham, Hanover, Markdale, Dundalk, Chatsworth, Bentinck, Normanby, Glenelg, Egremont, Proton, Artemesia, Osprey, Holland and Sullivan.

Women Poorly Protected

One woman who is limping around Walkerton is said to be walking lame from a kick she got from her husband some time ago. If we saw a horse limping from the same cause the chances are its owner would be punished and fined for cruelty to animals. But while the public can interfere on behalf of a horse, there doesn't seem to be any known law whereby they can butt in on a man's usage of his wife. The woman, of course, can complain on her own behalf, but where such course has been taken experience has shown that the promiscuous wife usually gets around before the trial takes place and wants the charge withdrawn, thereby in the meantime having evidently intimidated her with all kinds of threats and bull-dozed her into withdrawing the case. This is certainly poor protection for women, and the law should be so amended that any person seeing a man abuse his wife could lay a complaint off his own bat, the same as if he saw him abusing a dog, and have the culprit punished for the crime, instead of as at present, being unable to interfere, and leaving the responsibility on the hands of the already intimidated and cruelly abused wife. The picture of Legree with a whip in his hand beating a negro caused the most terrible war in the history of the world. Three millions of men flew at each other's throats and for four years fought like demons. A million men and six million dollars worth of property were destroyed, yet the sight of bullies beating white girls in Walkerton raises little or no comment, and the fellow who is gallant enough to interfere is likely to be kicked off the premises or soaked in the courts for trespass.
