After only a few days illness with a paralytic stroke, Mr. William Talbot, one of the early settlers in Grey County, passed away at his home near this village on Tuesday, June 23rd, aged 79 years. On Thursday afternoon the funeral took place to the English Church cemetery at Maxwell, service at the house being conducted by Rev. Mr. Hudson of this place, and at the grave by Rev. Mr. Williams, Anglican Minister, Dundalk, of which communion Mr. Talbot was a life-long member. In politics he was a staunch Conservative. The deceased was born in Markham township in 1836. About 55 years ago he came to Flesherton, settling first in the farm where he died and is succeeded by his son. About 54 years ago he was married to Miss Elizabeth Millar, of Proton, who survives with two sons, William J., on the farm, and David M., of Everett, Wash. Mr. Thos. Talbot, of Dundalk, is a brother of the deceased.

Toronto, June 30.—The Government of Sir James Whitney was yesterday returned to power in the general elections in Ontario.
