OSPREY COUNCIL

The members of the Municipal Council of the township of Osprey met at Maxwell according to adjournment from July 18th last.

L. Smith, proposition to construct a road on 30th sidewalk in concessions 2 and 3 South; Application from the Telephone Commissioners for issue of Debentures for \$700.00 to extend the system.

Orders were issued on the Treasurer to pay John Thompson, Irwin Morrison and J. L. Murdoch \$2.50 each, service on Road and Bridge Committee on townline Artemesia and Osprey; Owen Sound Hospital, \$102.10, keep of Rose Dawson; J. W. Tyson, \$4.00, and John McKinnon, \$22.66, sheep killed by dogs; Members of Council, \$2.50 each, special meeting to be changed to drain No. 3; Municipal World, acct., \$8.40; Thos. Scott, \$18, Debentures S.S. No. 5, Jas. Potts, \$14.00, service equalizing Union S.S.

The reports of roads and Bridge Committee regarding matters on the townline of Artemesia and Osprey, were adopted, each report recommending joint action with Artemesia Council. By-Law No. 592 was passed; adopting report of engineer as to damage scheme on the Centre Line and providing for the issue of Debentures for \$2,777.50, for 10 years at 6 per cent. interest, the estimate cost of said drain.

By-Law No. 593 was passed, providing for the issue of Debentures for Telephone extension for \$700 at 6 per cent. for 10 years. By-Law No. 594 was passed, levying \$300 for County Rate at 3 1-10 mills; \$4981.50 for grant to schools at 4 7-10 mills; \$5079.88 for township purposes at 4 8-10 mills; also the various amounts asked for and required by the school boards, school debentures, drainage and telephone debentures.

By-Law No. 595 was passed, appointing collectors for taxes as follows: Jas. Elliott for North half and W. S. Inkster for south half. The Commissioner of Div. No. 5 received a special grant of \$100 for the Valley road, said amount being granted in 1913 and not spent. The Council adjourned to meet at Maxwell on Sept. 5th next, upon which date the drainage Court of revision will be held.

BRITISH IMMIGRANTS

Mr. A. V. Smithers, chairman of the board of directors of the Grand Trunk Railway, stated in a recent interview, that the British emigrants coming out here were at once a gain to the Dominion and the Empire at large. When they come to you, he said, they are ready-made citizens. They have been brought up to conserve the laws under which you live. They have sentiments identical with your own. They are merely enlarging their horizon a bit. That is all. And under the old flag they are ready at any moment to render necessary service to the Empire in the moment of need. Moreover, they will leave, in any community, the other elements, and produce in time a wholesome citizenship. Therefore, concluded Mr. Smithers, encourage the British emigrant, who, although he leaves England, is not lost to the Empire.
