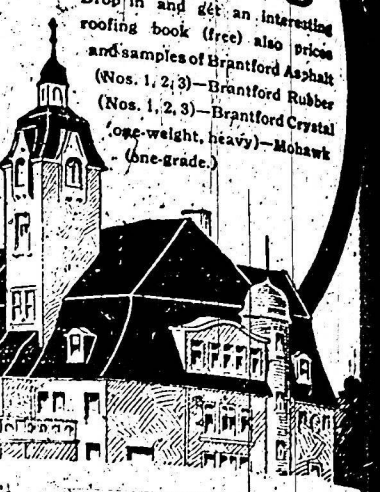

Important questions will be discussed and dealt with at the present session of conference, which will continue for several weeks.

### A meeting of the ratepayers of Dundalk was recently held in that village to consider the proposition made by the Pine River Light and Power Co. to supply electric energy to the village. Mr. J. M. Kilbourn of Owen Sound, who is a member of the company, was present at the meeting and outlined the scheme. The company proposes to deliver 200 horse power to the village at starting up, to transmit a sum estimated at \$3800 to consumers. The light and power to be considered by the council and may be submitted to a vote of the ratepayers.

### A man who was a through passenger on the express northbound Monday night had a close call from death or serious injury at the depot in Dundalk. He was under the influence of liquor and got off onto the platform when the train pulled in. When the train was starting up again he attempted to get aboard and fell over some luggage and between the platform and the moving cars. The brakeman quickly grabbed him out of his perilous position and caught the hand rail of the rear coach. The train by this time had good speed up and did not stop for its unfortunate passenger who was bound for Owen Sound. Chief Scriminger took charge of the man and gave him lodging in the lockup. Next morning he was taken to the north ward home on Friday last.

## Hydro Quotes \$23.24 Per H.P. for Markdale

### Public Meeting Will Be Held to Secure Information and Details.

### At the regular meeting of Markdale Council on Monday evening, at which the members were present, the following communication was read from the Hydro Electric Power Commission in reply to a letter from Clerk Shortill re the proposition to supply electric light and power to this town:—

Toronto, Sept. 22, 1914.  
W. J. Shortill, Esq.,  
Clerk of the Municipality,  
Markdale, Ontario.

Dear Sir,—

With reference to serving the Town of Markdale with power from the Eugenia Falls development, we beg to state that revised figures have been made up covering various towns in your district, and it has been estimated that H. E. P. can be delivered to your town at 4000 Volts for \$23.24 per H.P.

According to the present outlook we expect to be able to deliver power from Eugenia Falls by March 1915, and we would therefore suggest that whatever steps you intend to take towards passing the Enabling and Money By-Laws be undertaken as soon as possible in order that you may be ready for the service when the development is completed.

We will be very glad to send an engineer to your town to assist you in any way you may desire and give details and information in connection with this matter. Yours truly,

Hydro-Electric Power Commission, Ontario.

### In reference to the above letter, the Clerk was instructed to communicate with the Commission to secure an engineer's services in order that the matter in all detail may be laid before the citizens of Markdale. A public meeting will be held as soon as possible to consider the question.

## Hon. I. B. Lucas' Tribute To Sir James

### Declares Late Premier's Life Was An Inspiration, and an Ideal for All Men in Public Life.

### (From Mail and Empire.)

"The news of Sir James' sudden death was so unexpected that we who have been so closely associated with him can scarcely realize that he has been taken from us," said Hon. I. B. Lucas, Provincial Treasurer.

"For fifteen years I sat near him in the Legislature," continued Hon. Mr. Lucas, "and I say that whether in the management of the political party of which he was the leader, the consideration of policies to be adopted by the party, or in the daily routine of public business, never did I see him depart from the plain path of duty as he understood it. He may have sometimes been mistaken, but never consciously, I believe, did he ever allow political expediency, political threats or a desire to win popular approval to turn him by a hair's breadth from the line of action his judgment and his conscience pointed out to him as the correct one to follow."

### Strong in the faith that he was right, he always had the courage to do his duty as he saw it. Great responsibilities came to him, and the people of the province he loved and served have declared him faithful in all. To-day a united people try to express their sympathy and the grief-stricken widow and family.

### "He has gone, but the high standard of public life he set for himself and lived up to remains as an inspiration, an example, and an ideal for all men in public life."

### Mr. James Burns Dead.

### Older residents of Markdale will remember Mr. James Burns, at one time a prominent builder and contractor of this town, who, moved from this part over thirty years ago. In 1882 he went to Toronto again, and until five years ago has been in business there. He was a member of Grosvenor Street Presbyterian Church, and is survived by his widow, one son and three daughters, Mrs. W. W. Doran, Mrs. T. W. Gray, Toronto, and Mrs. Chas. Porter, Buffalo, and Mr. David Burns.
