From Chilliwack, B. C.

(From a news letter received
last week from a former Markdale
boy we give the following excerpt):

Chilliwack, B.C., Jan. 29, 1915.

Mr. C. C. Hattidge, Jr.

Mr. Dean Friend—Enclosed here
with you will please find a postal
note for \$2.00 on subscription for
the Standard. We get the Standard
regularly and it keeps us in touch
with the many friends we know. We
are having scarcely any winter here this year, no snow so
far, and very little frost. For the
last six weeks it has been more
like spring, with warm sunny days
and the dust blowing on the
streets like summer. The roads
are as smooth as in mid-summer. The
snow is about half way down
the mountain sides on the north
and south of us and the green valley
with almost summer weather
appears very pretty. Notwithstanding
the effects of the war and the
money stringency the people in
our Chilliwack valley seem to be
prosperous. About 150 men went
from our neighborhood to the war,
many others here are waiting for
the opportunity to go. I sold out
my store business quite some time ago
and built a block containing 6
stores and 33 office and rooms
upstairs. I have the stores all
rented and do not have to work
so hard now, but have to stay
at it until I get it all paid for,
which may be another year or two
and after that, if we are spared
we may drop in and see you in
Markdale.

Escaped From

Jerusalem.

The following we glean from The

Alliance Weekly, New York, regard-

ing the return of Rev. A. E.

Thompson, a former Armenian

bishop who has been superintend-

ent of a Jewish Mission in Jerusalem:

"Our readers and missionary

friends will be greatly relieved to

know that we have just received

letters from Rev. A. E. Thompson,

late of Jerusalem, written from

Egypt, also a cable from London,

announcing his arrival from Jaffa

about a fortnight ago and his

later arrival in London. He ex-

pects to sail to New York by

S. S. Adriatic about the 27th of

January, and may be expected

home during the first week in

February. He left Jerusalem be-

cause of an order of expulsion by the

Turkish authorities applying to all

British residents. He and his wife

with Mr. A. W. Payne and Miss

Beecroft, were all British subjects.

The American ladies have remained

in Jerusalem and have charge of the school work which is going on.

They appear to be perfectly safe

under the protection of the Ameri-

can Consul and with friendly inter-

est of the Turkish and German

authorities, who appear to be most

anxious to show every courtesy to

the United States. Mr. Thompson

reports considerable difficulty in

getting away from Jaffa, but

through the powerful and most

friendly intervention of Dr. Glazebrook,

the American Consul, backed

by a strong guard from the

Turkish police, he was able to

leave on the 27th of January.

He was met at the port of

Levant by a British naval vessel

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
