Act in the can. The quantity can be any one or the quantity to take up residence in Markdale and will be home to their friends.

The regulations made under the authority of the Act came into force on September 1st, and provides that when dairy butter is put up in blocks, squares or prints and wrapped in parchment paper, the paper shall be printed or branded with the words "Dairy Butter" in letters at least one quarter-inch square, in addition to any other wording that the buttermaker may desire to use. There is nothing in the Act of Regulations to prevent the use of the word "Separator" in addition to the words "Dairy Butter" but no such grade as "Separator" is recognized by the law. The Butter Act of 1909 defines only two grades, namely, "Dairy" and "Creamery." The Dairy Industry Act of 1914 defines a third grade as "Whey" butter. Buttermakers may use form of printing or branding, including the words "Dairy Butter," which is not inconsistent with the definition of dairy butter. Butter in rolls, crocks or tubs is not required to be branded. The definition of dairy butter is found in Section 3 of the Act and is the same as it was in the Butter Act of 1903. It reads as follows:

(d) "Dairy Butter" means a place where the milk or cream of less than fifty cows is manufactured into butter.

(e) "Dairy Butter" means butter which is manufactured in a dairy."

Joseph Beatty.

Mr. Joseph Beatty, a pioneer of Orange Valley, died in the General Hospital, Toronto, on Tuesday morning of the 9th inst., of pneumonia. Mr. Beatty had not been in rugged health during the past year and contracted La Grippe while in Toronto where he had been since before Christmas. In a letter dated Feb. 1st, he expressed the expectation of soon being better when he would return, but a few days later pneumonia developed and he went to the hospital some three days prior to his death with above result. The remains were brought to Markdale by Wednesday night train and conveyed to Mrs. Hollingshead's, a lifelong friend and neighbor; and on Thursday pm., were conveyed to the Methodist church, where Rev. R. M. Hansen, in the absence of the pastor, who was ill, conducted an appropriate service after which an interment took place in the public cemetery. The Orange Brotherhood of which deceased had long been a member conducted the funeral obsequies and also furnished a heating wreath. The pall bearers were Messrs. Ed. Baker, John Budden, Robt. McGrath, Fred Sargeant, Geo. Warling and S. J. Halbert. Deceased was born in Sullivan Township and was three years old when his parents settled in Orange Valley 64 years ago, then a dense forest. He grew to be a most kind hearted man, an excellent and hospitable neighbor, and his integrity unquestioned. He married Rachel Dixon, who predeceased him three years ago last December in California, where they had gone for the benefit of her health. Their family of four all survive, viz. W. J. Beatty, on the homestead, John, Vancouver, B.C., Mrs. Sil Hill, Artemesia, and Miss Maggie, Los Angeles, Cal.

Had Feet Frozen.

Daily News, Feb. 8.—A man of about 80 years of age, whose name is believed to be Beattie, was found early today by Mr. Sutherland, a farmer, of Holt, Ontario, as he was driving into Mt. Albert. The old man was lying unconscious in the roadway and both his feet were frozen. He was brought to Toronto on a C.N.O. train and removed to the General Hospital in F.W. Matthew's private ambulance. It was found necessary to amputate both the man's feet, and he now lies in a precarious condition.

The above had no connection whatever with the late Jos. Beatty, the latter being in the hospital when this incident happened.—Ed. Standard.
