What Is Going On In the Highlands and Lowlands of Auld Scotia?

Owing to an epidemic of scarlet fever, the schools in Campbellton have all been closed.

Edinburgh Chamber of Commerce has been discussing the prospect of new industries being built in the city.

Lockeby Town Council has accepted estimates for the erection of a public slaughterhouse at a cost of \$6,000.

The death has occurred at Aberdeen of Mr. Robert Lumsden, advocate, Procurator Fiscal for the city in his 69th year.

The Glasgow Royal Medical Hospital, better known to the public as Gartnavel Asylum, has attained its centenary.

A Fraternal centenarian has passed away in the person of Mr. George Bruce, who has just died in his 100th year.

The fund which is being raised by the Scottish Chamber of Agriculture and affiliated societies is already close on \$6,500.

Twelve members of the Argyleshire county council are serving with the colors, five of them colonels or lieutenant-colonels.

The greater part of Glencadam Distillery, Brechin, has been destroyed by fire, and damage estimated at about \$25,000 was caused.

As a result of Navy Day in Glasgow, a sum of \$12,716 was collected for the purpose of supplying the men of the fleet with warm clothing.

British Legation has agreed to a grant of £1,000 to the Glasgow hospitals, the sum to be used for the treatment of British soldiers.

Two British officers have been appointed to the staff of the Glasgow General Hospital.

On the second day of the month, the Glasgow Crystal Palace was opened to the public.

Shipments of Copper

A despatch from Milan says: Notwithstanding rigid precautions taken by the authorities to prevent the re-exportation from Italy of dangerous nations of goods classed as contraband of war, it has been discovered that large quantities of copper have been sent to Berlin concealed in trucks loaded with cabbages. Officials now have increased their vigilance in attempting to check this trade.

MELLISH'S COMET VISIBLE.

It Will Pass Round the Sun on July 20th.

A despatch from Cambridge, Mass., says: Mellish's comet, which is visible in the morning skies through a small telescope and will increase in brilliancy, and will make its perihelion passage around the sun on July 20, according to computations made by Professor Crawford of the Student's Observatory, Berkeley, Calif., and announced at the Harvard Observatory on Wednesday. The probable light of the comet on March 3 was calculated at 1.79, and according to the computations, this will increase to 2.17 by March 17.



MARCH 11.

Lesson XI. Saul Gains His Kingdom.—1 Sam. 11. Golden Text, Prov. 16. 32.

Verse 1. Nahash the Ammonite—“Nahash” means “snake.” He was king of the Ammonites, as we read in 1 Sam. 19, 20; 2 Sam. 10, 1, 2; 17, 27. In 2 Sam. 17, 25 we read that Abigail was the daughter of Nahash, the sister of Zeruiah, 1 Chron. 2, 15, 16. Zeruiah is mentioned as one of the sisters of David. In 2 Sam. 10, we learn that Nahash had been sent to David, and in 2 Sam. 17, 27 that Shobi, the son of Nahash, was friendly to David in his flight.
