DURHAM

Mr. Thos. Nichol, of Durham, died suddenly on Monday, of last week, from hemorrhage of the stomach brought on by a fit of coughing. He was 37 years of age and by trade a blacksmith. He leaves a wife and four children.

THORNHURST

A gloom was cast over Thornbury and Clarksburg when it was learned early Monday morning that Walter Loucks, the popular young champion of Clarksburg, had been claimed by death. Although suffering from a cold he attended Orange Lodge meeting on Monday night. On Tuesday the cold grew worse, and on advice from the Dr. took to bed. Dr. McFaul, of Collingwood, was summoned and after a careful examination held out but slight chances of his recovery. In spite of everything that could be done the end came early Monday morning. To the bereaved ones we extend our heart-felt sympathy.—Thornbury Review-Herald.

MEAFORD

The Mirror entered last week upon its 34th year of publication and never looked more prosperous or better gotten up.

Last week, Mr. Robert Dixon Kerr, of Heathcote, received official notice from Crown Attorney T. H. Dyer, appointing him a Justice of the Peace for the County of Grey. Dixon is a son of the late John F. Dixon, who for a number of years held a similar office. Although young in years, Mr. Kerr is already well known to most of our readers as an energetic wide-awake young man that is bound to climb the ladder of success. We predict for him a bright career and congratulate the Crown Attorney on his choice.

Austin Govette received a cheque for \$20.79, issued under the Workmen's Compensation Act, as payment for a sick claim being the result of an accident received at the Heathcote Factory Mirror.

William Kovatt is awarded \$1700 damages for injuries received in Leaman Kent Co's. factory. On the 17th of June last whilst the plaintiff was working on a machine known as an end matcher, designed to cut the ends of hardwood lumber, so that they will tongue and groove together, he was struck on one of his eyes by a piece of flooring that he was holding in his machine, the end flying up as he alleges because of the lack of spring which was originally in the machine placed there to keep such boards from flying back. OWEN SOUND

It is probable that the men of the Third Contingent in training here will not leave Owen Sound until the end of May, according to information which has been received here lately. And when they do go it is not known to what part they will be sent, though Niagara and Petawa are being mentioned as likely points of destination for further drilling. Also rumor has it that Valcartier is to be utilized again as a training place for the whole contingent. Meantime the men here are making good progress in the rudiments of drill, and are impatient for the warm weather so that they can go out to the ranges and shoot and also take hikes into the country

and do their various evolutions without being cramped up in close quarters. With the double purpose of inspecting the work done and instructing the officers, Col. W. A. Logie, of Toronto, will visit the Third Contingent Detachments in the district next week. He will be accompanied by Major H. C. Bickford, general staff officer, Lieut. W. Ford Howland, intelligence officer, Major R. K. Barker, in charge of physical training and a musketry officer yet to be selected. —Times.

One of the principal topics that will come before the Board of Trade at the meeting to-night will be the report of the deputation which was on the Provincial Government last week to ask assistance in the building of a trunk wagon road from Owen Sound to Collingwood. It is likely that an endeavor will be made to interest the municipalities that will benefit in the building of the road and if the municipalities can be induced to take steps to build it, the Government will be asked to bear fifty per cent while the County of Grey and towns and townships through which the road would pass will bear the other fifty per cent. Under the Highway Act, the Government agrees to bear thirty-three and a third per cent., providing the remainder of the cost is borne by the municipalities through which the road will pass, but owing to the unusual circumstances in connection with this road, it is probable the Government may be induced to give more assistance to the project if it can be shown that the road is a benefit to the Province as a whole.

The estimated cost of the road is believed by those who have investigated the matter that the road can be built for about \$150,000. Calculating the cost to each farmer on this basis, the cost for each one hundred acres in the townships through which the road passes would be about \$1.25 per year for twenty years, in addition to about eight cents per year for each one hundred acres in the County of Owen Sound, or about 15 cents on each \$1000 of assessment.

An important feature of the project is that it would furnish much needed employment to a great number of men during the summer. Providing the Government could be induced to bear one-half the cost, the burden on the ratepayers will be very light.—Sun.

The Council has decided to spend \$500.00 in renovating the town Hall, and the Board of Trade proposes to ask the Council to issue debentures for building of an elevator as a civic undertaking.

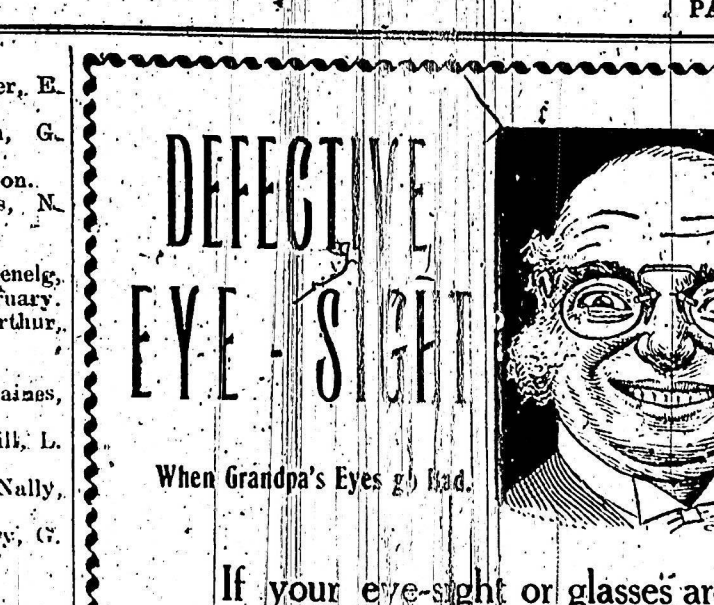
