A Record Hail Storm.

Between the hours of three and five o'clock on Sunday last a most severe hail storm, accompanied by thunder and lightning and a tremendous downpour of rain, swept over Markdale and vicinity, causing extensive damage, chiefly in broken windows. Many of the older citizens claim that it was the worst storm Markdale has ever witnessed.

'Twas a real flood, water pouring from eaves, gushing from the spouts and running in every direction. The streets were as a troubled sea, the water, which was several inches deep all over the sidewalks and roads, shaking and bouncing as a sea in time of storm, while the hail, which varied from the size of a pea to that of an egg, caused a continuous splash.

After the storm the hail lay in large patches like snow and ice, and was some four or five inches deep in places and early in the afternoon of the following day the hail had remained in many places to such an extent that it could have been gathered up in shovelfuls.
Hundreds of dollars worth of glass was destroyed. There is scarcely a house or building in town that did not suffer. Over 250 lights were broken in the Anglican Church, at a loss of \$125.00. The whole of the block from Mercer's store to Hill's store on the other corner suffered heavily by broken windows in the rear. There were 37 large window panes broken in the Public School, over a dozen in Mr. R. L. Stephen's residence on Mark street, numerous lights in the Masonic Hall, Mrs. Jackson's residence, the Revere House and many residences and other buildings. Besides the windows destroyed, the rain was such an enormous downpour that the roofs, many of which were cut in holes like a sieve, leaked furiously, causing damage to house furnishings.

Electric light and telephone wires were stripped and a few poles in the west of the village were badly damaged.
Early Monday morning hardware merchants, carpenters, and men of all trades, who could repair broken sashes and put in new lights, putty, etc., etc., were all busy, so that at the time of writing, the minor damages and many of the larger ones have been repaired.
The path of the storm was narrow, travelling south east, and Markdale was certainly in that path.

Best Grain for Quebec and Ontario.

In Bulletin No. 81 of the Ontario regular series issued by the Director of the Dominion Experimental Farms and entitled "Division of Cereals: Summary of Results, 1914," Dr. Charles E. Saunders, Dominion Cerealist, recommends the following varieties of grain for Quebec and Ontario:
"Spring Wheat—Red Fife and White Fife, good sorts but late in ripening. Huron, Marquis and Early Red Fife are earlier, Huron is vigorous and productive but not equal to the others for bread-baking. Prelude, if the soil is rich and rainfall sufficient, is recommended for extreme northern districts. In Southern Ontario Blue Stem gives good results. Goose wheat is useful in extra dry localities. Nubanka makes excellent bread, but it is not in favour with millers.
Oats—Banner and Ligowo are good, but where extreme earliness is desired and Eighty day will best fill the bill.
Barley—Mancharian and Ontario Agricultural College No. 21, are best six-rowed varieties. Dudsell, Canadian Thorpe and Chevallier (best strains) two-rowed varieties. No varieties of headless or hullless are recommended, but Success is early ripening.
Peas—Arthur for earliness and productivity; Golden Vine, Chancellor and White Marrowfat are good and Prussian Blue, Wisconsin Blue and English Grey are recommended for colour.
