Evils of Liquor Traffic

At a recent meeting of the council, Mr. Neely was granted permission to move his stable back from the street line to the rear of his lot. This was a commendable request on the part of Mr. Neely as the benefit from such change will be more for his next neighbor and the public than for himself. Others would do well to emulate this kind of public spirit.

Mr. Henry Wells was granted a permit to erect on his lot on Mark Street a two-story brick residence in accordance with plan submitted, the front wall to be at least sixty feet back from the street line. The Clerk was authorized to issue 100 copies of the By-Laws and regulations.

A Record Hail Storm.

Between the hours of three and five o'clock on Sunday last a most severe hail storm, accompanied by thunder and lightning, and a tremendous downpour of rain, swept over Markdale and vicinity, causing extensive damage, chiefly in broken windows. Many of the older citizens claim that it was the worst storm Markdale has ever witnessed.

Twelve hours later, a real flood, water pouring from eaves, rushing from the spouts and running in every direction. The streets were as a troubled sea, the water, which was several inches deep all over the sidewalks and roads, shaking and bouncing as a sea in time of storm, while the hail, which varied from the size of a pea to that of an egg, caused a continuous splash.

After the storm the hail lay in large patches like snow and ice, and was some four or five inches deep in places and early in the afternoon of the following day the hail had remained in many places to such an extent that it could have been gathered up in shovels.

Hundreds of dollars worth of glass was destroyed. There is scarcely a house or building in town that did not suffer. Over 250 lights were broken in the Mercier's store, the whole of the block from the other corner suffered heavily by broken windows in the rear. There were 37 large window panes, broken in the Public School, over a dozen in Mr. L. Stephen's residence on Mark street, numerous lights in the Masonic Hall, Mrs. Jackson's residence, the Revere House and many residences and other buildings. Besides the windows destroyed, the rain was such an enormous downpour that the roofs, many of which were cut in holes like a sieve, leaked furiously, causing damage to house furnishings.

Electric light and telephone wires were stripped and a few poles in the west of the village were badly damaged.

Early Monday morning hard-working merchants, carpenters, and men of all trades, who could repair broken sashes and put in new lights, putty, etc., etc., were all busy, so that at the time of writing, the minor damages and many of the larger ones have been repaired.

The path of the storm was narrow, travelling south east, and Markdale was certainly in that path.

A gang of men have been planting poles on the Eugenia and Owen Sound line and will this week reach Markdale from the power house, some seven miles.

No Money In Boxes.

According to instructions from the Post Office Department, all letters placed in rural mail boxes must be fully prepaid. The practice of placing money in the box to pay postage, which has prevailed, is to be discontinued, and the carrier shall not be required to collect any mail matter which does not bear the required postage.

War Stamp Notice.

In reference to the bank business the Act provides that "No person shall issue a cheque payable at or through a bank unless there is affixed thereto an adhesive stamp or unless there is impressed thereon, by means of a die a stamp of the value of two cents, and every adhesive stamp affixed to a cheque shall be cancelled by the bank at which the cheque is payable at or before the time of payment."

Every person who issues a cheque payable at or by a bank to which there is not affixed an adhesive stamp or on which there is not impressed by means of a die a stamp of the value of two cents shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty dollars."

"Every bank which issues, pays, presents for payment or accepts, for a cheque or other bill of exchange, or promissory note upon which a stamp of the value of two cents has not been affixed or impressed in accordance with the requirements of this section shall be liable to a penalty of one hundred dollars."
