Death of Wm. I. Neely.

At the advanced age of 77 years
and 2 months, death claimed an-
other old resident of this district
on Wednesday morning of last
week in the person of William I.
Neely after an illness of some

in 1852 and located in Ephraim
township, where he continued to
reside practically ever since. While
devoting his energies to farming he
in his early days bought cattle
and drove them from Rockton to
Toronto before the railroad came
through here, a trip that would
sometimes take a week. He also
operated a threshing outfit in part-
nership with his brother, Jacob
Neely, which they continued until
ago. Being of a speculative turn
of mind the late Mr. Neely came
into possession of considerable
property including some city
property as well as four hundred
acres of farm land in Ephraim.
Deceased was a bachelor and is
survived by one brother, Mr. Jacob
Neely, this town, six others of the
family having predeceased him.
While residing at Rockton de-
ceased was an adherent of Temple Hill
Presbyterian Church and the fun-
eral was held from his nephew's,
Mr. Jacob Neely, Susan Street, to
Temple Hill Church Cemetery on
