The Council met on May 1st, pursuant to adjournment. All the members present, the Reeve in the chair, minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications read as follows: from L. G. Campbell, asking permission to erect telephone poles on roads in Glenelg; T. J. Hannigan, re Hydro Electric Railway. The Reeve presented the agreement re imposing suit "Ross vs Glenelg." Account from Lucas Raney and Henry, for Legal Service in 1914 and 1915. Garnishee papers in suit "Ross vs Keys." W. W. Pope, re Hydro Electric Power; Wm. Irwin, balance of printing account; Jno. Kelly, statement of bank account; several giving permission to erect telephone poles in Glenelg Roads was introduced and read a first and second time.

McInnis-Pearl - That A. McLachlin be paid \$1.25, half cost of work on fowling gun.—Carried.

Turnbull-McInnis - That A. McLachlin be paid \$2.00 for inspecting sheep killed by dogs.—Carried.

Pearl-Turnbull - That this Municipality hereby endorse the Hydro-Electric Railway programme as outlined in the memorial presented to the Hon. Mr. Hearst and the Provincial Government on Friday, March 26th, 1915, by a deputation representing the majority of the Municipalities of Ontario.—Carried.

The Council adjourned to June 5th, at 10 p.m.
