The sudden death on Wednesday last week of Mr. Thomas Pallister, of Berkeley suburbs, was a shock to the community. Mr. Pallister went to the barn between 8 and 9 o'clock p.m. to see that the horses were all right and as was his custom to proceed from there across fields a short cut to Berkeley, some five minutes walk, almost every night, remaining until the 9.40 train came in, no unbusiness was experienced until nearly 11 o'clock, when he failed to return. Search was then made about the barn and yard, then to the village, but no trace was found of him. The search was continued most of the day, but not until after 6 Friday morning was the body found. He evidently after crossing a fence between the barn and the village, dropped dead. Coroner, Dr. Bilby and Dr. Ego examined the body, but considered it quite unnecessary to hold an inquest. Deceased was a quiet inoffensive man. The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon at the Plesherton Cemetery and was largely attended. Rev. J. H. Hosford conducted the service at the house and the grave. Mr. Pallister was born in Osprey 50 years ago, where he spent his first 40 years, after which he resided about ten years on the Toronto line between Markdale and Plesherton and ten at Berkeley. Besides his wife he leaves two sons, Harry, of Bala, and Edward at home. The sympathy of the community goes out to the bereaved family.

## Letter From The Front Silver Wedding Anniversary.

The following letter was received by Alderman Davis from his brother Tom, who is on the firing line in France. May 5th, 1915.

Dear Wes,— Just received your letter of April 10th. Glad to hear from dear old Canada. I suppose you have read all about our big scrap by this time. I think hell is a sideshow compared to what we were through last week. We were in the first line of trenches for four days and nights, then relieved by a Scottish regiment; then we were in reserve for about a week and under fire more or less all the time.

I could not describe the first four days. Shells of all kinds were falling like rain and the roar of the big guns was terrible. We held the position against great odds and put our share of Germans out of business.

The Germans are very brave men and good fighters. They wear a light grey coat which makes a good target. This country must be full of spies for our telephone wires from the first line trenches to the artillery in the rear are continually being cut. Now, I guess the papers will tell you the balance. I came through the scrap O.K. though I have two bullet holes in my tunic which I did not find for a few days after we were relieved. We are several miles from the firing line now having a rest and being reorganized. The Toronto Regiment is like the thin red line of historic fame. This is a fine big town we are in now. We can buy anything we want. The English papers are just a day late. There is nothing I need, thank you. We get \$6.00 per month and to-day is pay day. All for now. Roger is O. K.
