The Passing of a Notable Pioneer.

Thursday, June 10th, a man of more than local note was laid in his last earthly resting place in McLean's Cemetery. Holland, William Sutherland had attained a veritable patriarchal age, being within two months and a few days of ninety four years. The writer saw him in public almost a year ago, when attending the funeral of the late Mr. Adams. Mr. Sutherland was then a man wonderfully well preserved, keenly interested in current events and taking some part in life's activities, especially those pertaining to his church. He continued this up to last winter, when a heavy cold fastened upon him and ultimately carried him off. Dr. McCulloch, of Walters Falls, his physician for the last thirty years, who was present with his wife and sons at the funeral, told the writer it was a case in medical phraseology, of "senile decay," but in more homely language of "wearing out of a human machine."

Mr. Sutherland was born in Cairness Shire, Scotland, where in 1855 he was married to Christina McPhail. They came to Canada with one child, Colin, in 1854. School teaching for upwards of thirty years in Scotland and later in Canada occupied Mr. Sutherland's time, but farming subsequently became his chief vocation. He settled on the farm on which he ended his days, fifty-five years ago. Holland was then mostly "Forest Primeval." The Sutherland farm was no exception. This Mr. and Mrs. Sutherland took a place in the ranks of the real "Makers of Canada" and they wrought well and their works do follow them. In every department of life they threw themselves unreservedly into the betterment of their adopted land. For many years Mr. Sutherland acted as Secretary-Treasurer of the local school. He was also treasurer of the 100th line Presbyterian Church, which he had been mainly instrumental in founding. In the early days when a church building was not available, sacramental gatherings convened in Sutherland's barn. The older members of the family distinctly remember the activity preceding "Sacrament" when the "threshing floor" was scrupulously put in order for the "Great Occasion." Mr. Sutherland was an honored and godly elder in Knox Congregation from its inception. The present very beautiful church, built twenty odd years ago, is in large part the fruit of his labors. He was also one of the prime movers in organizing McLean's Cemetery, where he now "rests from his labors."

This was the first break in the family circle, and Mrs. Sutherland, eight sons and three daughters survive, viz. two sons, William and James, reside on the old homestead, Colin in Derby, George in Sault Ste. Marie, while John, Kenneth, Charles and Alexander are situated within easy reach of the "Old Home," and attend the Church, which their father and mother did so much to establish. The sisters are: Mrs. Curry, of Morrison; Mrs. Henry, farm to the Homestead and Mrs. Laman; in the near neighborhood.

Mr. Lee, pastor of Knox Church, conducted the obsequies. Mr. Phalen who had a longer acquaintance with the old gentleman, by request, gave the funeral address. The late Mr. Sutherland was a good sample of the "Real Highland Gentleman" strong in his religious convictions, firm in character, conscientious in his political beliefs, yet withal tolerant in all, he was a fine type of the intelligent Presbyterian and an honored member of the "old school Liberals." Peace be to his ashes—Canada owes much to such men.
