How to Fight Grasshoppers.

A vigorous campaign on grasshoppers is now being waged in Markdale and Lily Dale districts. For the past few days the farmers, armed with the poisoned mixture, have been dealing with the blots against this pest. The slogan was "Every one must fight." The mixture is giving excellent results. The amount required for 5 acres is as follows: Bran 25 lbs., Paris green 1 lb., Molasses 2 qts., Water 3 qts. The trap and paris green, though mixed dry, then moistened with the water and molasses, which the juice and shredded pulp of the lemons have been added.

The utility of only part of farmers treating their grasshopper infested land with the poisoned mixture was fully demonstrated by the result that everyone taking part in this work, green molasses (black strap), bran and water is giving excellent results. The amount required for 5 acres is as follows: Bran 25 lbs., Paris green 1 lb., Molasses 2 qts., Water 3 qts. The trap and paris green, though mixed dry, then moistened with the water and molasses, which the juice and shredded pulp of the lemons have been added. The farmers of Berkeley district, being the need of immediate steps being taken, are holding a campaign meeting Wednesday evening, June 31st, in the Orange Hall, Berkeley. Everyone should be interested in controlling this pest.
