Synopsis of Ganadian North-West Land Regulations West Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a cuarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six monstar residence upon and cultivation of the Fand in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his bomestead on a farm of at loast 68 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may breempt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per sere.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 hores extra cultivation. Proemption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Dutles—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.



The mainspring is similar to that used in a watch, but naturally of much greater power. It is coiled up in a circular case attached to the gun just in front of the trigger, in a position sufficiently far from the barrel to be unaffected by the heat, and consequently in no danger of losing its temper from overheating. The magazine is circular, the forty-seven cartridges with which it is loaded lying radially in two layers, their bullets pointing to the centre.
