cement tile moulds. The corpora-

this way tile of a superior quality
is furnished for drains, culverts,
drive way crossings, etc., at a
very low cost. The moulds are 8
and 12 inch diameter.

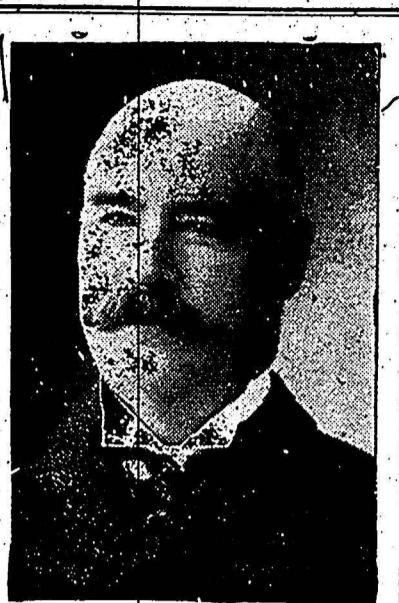

Mr. T. I. Thomson, ex-M. P.,
was notified by wire last Tuesday
evening of his appointment to the
office of Sheriff of the County of
Grey, which was rendered vacant
through the death of Mr. Chas. H.
Moore, a few weeks ago. The an-
nouncement did not occasion any
great surprise, for it had been con-
sidered for several days previous
that he was the likely man. The
decision was reached at a confer-
ence in Toronto on Tuesday of Mr.
C. S. Cameron, M. P. P., and the
members for East and South Grey
Hon. I. B. Lucas, Attorney-General,
and Dr. Jamieson. From the
multitude of applications, the
choice finally rested on Mr. Thom-
son.

The appointment is a popular
one and is satisfactory to the pub-
lic, irrespective of politics. Mr.
Thomson has been actively associ-
ated with the business and pub-
lic life of Owen Sound for years, and
has the confidence of the citizens
in general. Following the an-
nouncement there was the usual
outcry from some of the lesser

the cause of the fire.

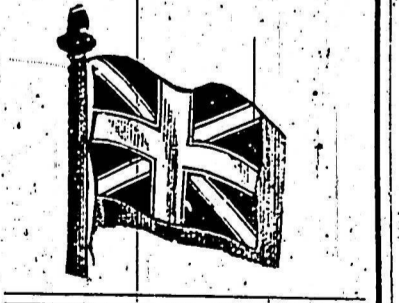
