May Be Made in Canada

Further information became available this afternoon as to today's conference between banking and manufacturing interests and the Premier and Minister of Militia.
Practically the sole proposition submitted to the gathering was that of General Mahan, the British expert, accompanying Mr. D. A. Thomas, the representative of Lloyd George. The idea emphasized was that orders for between two and three thousand heavy guns for the British Government may be placed in Canada for delivery within a period of two years. There would be five or six sizes.
General Mahan thought that the different Canadian manufacturers might equip their factories to make the component parts and allow the assembling to be done at one central point. The opinion was expressed by one Toronto manufacturer that the British firms should devote more attention to guns and allow a greater proportion of shell orders to come to Canada. It was pointed out, however, that the equipment needed in the making of shells is wholly different from that required for guns.
Mr. Robert Holison, of the Steel Company of Canada, and Col. Cantley, of Nova Scotia Steel Company, stated that there is no question of the ability of Canada to supply the nickel steel required in such an undertaking.
Col. Carnegie, of the Shell Company, announced that Canadian firms are now turning out six hundred thousand shells per month.

A PEACH OF AN ESSAY

Did you ever notice that when we want to praise anything with unusual emphasis we call it something else? For instance, if we wish to praise a book or a picture we say, "It is a gem." We do this because we mean the most precious thing that we can possess—the only concrete example of "gem" in its little room.
A gem is a thing that has the finest natural qualities, enriched and perfected by art, and when we say that a thing is a gem we mean that it is the perfection of its kind, a finished product about which no further or higher praise is possible.
But calling a thing a "gem" is only one metaphor. There are many others, but in all cases the word we use instead of what we mean denotes the existence of some quality in the thing described that is only reached in the thing we name in its stead.
This suggests a method of determining the things in Nature and art that are perfect, for only the perfect things are used as metaphors. Their imperfections may vary but in every case a perfection is indicated.
Among our fruits there are two that are used as metaphors often more than any other and by that fact may judge of their surpassing quality. One is used in public life and the other in everyday life. In public life the man who secures a high position in favor or a contract that will enrich him, is said to have got "a plum." This suggests that he has got something that all men earnestly desire, something so packed with richness and all goodness that it can only be described by calling it a plum—the fruit of which a celebrated horticulturist, E. P. Powell, says that "it contains more richness than any other fruit. It is rich in color, flavor and odor and as satisfying to the palate as it is to the eye. It is for this reason that it has gained its political significance as a metaphor. As the fruit most perfect and rich of its kind it suggests to the greedy politicians what they most desire and one of them who has been so fortunate as to secure a plum never wants anything else all his life but more plums. And the plums, when they are ripe are entirely worthy of the high regard they receive from housewives as well as politicians.
Our other metaphorical fruit is the peach. Just listen to some youth saying of a beautiful girl that "She is a peach" and even if you had never tasted a peach you would know that it must be sweet, beautiful, and exquisite, just as we all know that it is. The peach is the one thing that we can use without offense as a metaphor for a beautiful girl and there is nothing more alluring and perfect that we can use as a metaphor for a peach. To say that a peach is a peach is the highest praise we can bestow on it unless we say that it is a Canadian peach" for our "made in Canada" peaches are admitted to surpass all other peaches as much as they surpass all other fruits. Canadians have a right to be proud of them and to be fond of them and the housewife who puts up a plentiful supply of them is the one who is most certain to be regarded by her husband and her children as "a Peach."

Village of Markdale

BY-LAW NO. 265.
To take the vote of the ratepayers of the Village of Markdale on a question to be submitted whether the ratepayers are in favor of a supply of Electric power from the Hydro-Electric power commission of Ontario.
Whereas the Municipal Council of the Village of Markdale deems it advisable to submit to the ratepayers of the Village of Markdale a question as to whether the said ratepayers are in favor of a supply of electric power from the Hydro-Electric power commission of Ontario.
Therefore the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Markdale enacts as follows:
1. That the following question be submitted to the ratepayers of the Village of Markdale entitled to vote on Money By-Laws.
"Are you in favor of obtaining from the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario a supply of Electric Power."
2. That the votes of the said ratepayers shall be taken on this question at the following time and place by the following deputy returning officer and poll clerk hereinafter mentioned, that is to say: at The Public Library in the Village of Markdale at 9 o'clock a.m. and close at 5 o'clock p.m. J. G. McDuff, Poll Clerk.
3. A true copy of this by-law shall be published in the following newspaper on the days hereinafter mentioned, that is to say, in the Markdale Standard, on August 12, Aug. 19 and Aug. 26th, 1915, and a copy of this By-Law shall be posted at the Public Library, Post Office, Reeve's Office, and Clerk's Office, in the Village of Markdale.
4. On 23rd day of August at the Clerk's office in the Village of Markdale at 10 o'clock a.m. the reeve will in writing signed by him appoint two persons to attend the final summing up of the votes by the clerk of this corporation and one person to attend each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of the answering of the said question in the affirmative and a like number of persons interested in and desirous of answering the said question in the negative respectively.
5. The 31st day of August, at the Clerk's office, Markdale, at 10 o'clock forenoon is hereby appointed for the summing up by the clerk of this corporation of the votes given in the affirmative and in the negative respectively. Made passed and enacted this 30th day of July, 1915.

By-Law No. 266.
To authorize the borrowing of \$9,000.00 by the issue and sale of debentures, to provide for the cost of a plant to distribute electric power to be supplied by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario.
Passed August 30th, 1915.
Whereas it is necessary to raise by way of loan on the credit of the Municipal Corporation of the Village of Markdale the sum of \$9,000.00 to provide for the cost of works, plant, machinery and appliances necessary for the distribution of electric power in the said Municipal Corporation of the Village of Markdale to be supplied by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario.
And whereas the sum of \$9,000 is the debt intended to be created by this By-Law.
And whereas it is desirable to issue the said debentures at one time and to make the principal of the said debt repayable in yearly sums during the period of thirty years, being the currency of said debentures, said yearly sums being of such respective amounts that the aggregate amount payable each year for principal and interest in respect of the said debt shall be as nearly as possible equal to the amount payable in each of the other Twenty-nine years of the said period.
And whereas the total amount required to be raised annually by special rate for paying the said debt and interest as hereinafter provided is \$653.84.
And whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the said Municipal Corporation of the Village of Markdale, according to the last revised assessment roll thereof, is \$365,769.00.
And whereas the amount of the existing debenture debt of the said Municipal Corporation of the Village of Markdale, exclusive of local improvement debts, is \$41,

675.00, and no part of the principal or interest is in arrears.
Therefore the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Markdale enacts as follows:
1. That for the purpose aforesaid it shall be lawful for the Reeve and Treasurer of the said Municipal Corporation of the Village of Markdale to borrow the sum of \$9,000.00 and to issue debentures of the said Corporation to the amount of \$9,000.00, each of which debentures shall be dated on the date of the issue thereof, and shall be payable within thirty years thereafter at the office of the Treasurer of the said Corporation.
2. The said debentures shall be payable in thirty annual instalments during the thirty years next after the issue thereof, and the total amounts of principal and interest payable during each of the said years shall be as follows:

3. Each of the said debentures shall be signed by the Reeve of the said Municipal Corporation of the Village of Markdale, or by some other person authorized by-law to sign same and by the Treasurer thereof, and the Clerk shall seal the same with the common seal of the said Corporation.
4. The said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum, payable yearly at the office of the said Treasurer and shall have attached thereto coupons for the payment of same, which coupons shall be signed by the Reeve and Treasurer of the said Municipal Corporation of the Village of Markdale.
5. During the currency of the said debentures, there shall be raised annually by special rate on all the rateable property in the said Village of Markdale the sum of \$653.84 for the purpose of paying the amount due in each of the said years for principal and interest in respect to the said debt.
6. This By-Law shall take effect and come into operation from and after the final passing thereof.
7. The votes of the ratepayers of the said Village of Markdale shall be taken on this question on the 30th day of August, A.D. 1915, commencing at the hour of 9 a.m. and continuing until 5 p.m. at the following places, and by the Deputy Returning Officer and Poll Clerk hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:
At the Public Library in the Village of Markdale and James E. Matson shall be Returning Officer, and J. G. McDuff shall be Poll Clerk.
8. On the 23rd day of August, A.D. 1915, the Reeve will attend to appear in writing, signed by him, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk of this Corporation and one person to attend each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of promoting the passing of this By-Law, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this By-Law.
The Clerk's Office at the said Village of Markdale at 18 o'clock, forenoon, on the 31st day of August, A.D. 1915, is hereby appointed for the summing up by the Clerk of this Corporation of the number of votes given for and against this By-Law.

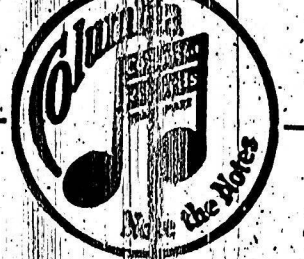

The tax will be 10% on profits earned during the war.
The tax will apply to profits earned by individuals and corporations.
The tax will be levied on the net profit of the business.
The tax will be paid by the individual or corporation.
The tax will be assessed by the Board of Revenue.
The tax will be payable within 6 months of the end of the year.
The tax will be subject to appeal to the Board of Appeal.
The tax will be subject to penalty for non-payment.
The tax will be subject to seizure of property for non-payment.
