Artemesia Council.

The Municipal Council of the Township of Artemesia met in the Town Hall at Fisherton on Monday, the 16th day of September, 1915. The members were all present, the leave in the chair. The minutes of last regular session and special session on the tenth of August were read and confirmed. Petitions from the residents of the Villages of Ceylon and Eugenia requesting the Council to obtain from the Hydro-Electric Power Commission estimates of cost of supplying light and power in accordance with provisions of the Power Commission Act 1911. Commissioner J. J. Graham reported on expenditure in his division. Commissioner A. Cameron reported on building bridges on con. 4, at lot 28, and con. 7, lot 27, and work on townline, Artemesia and Osprey.

By-Law 18 to levy rates for 1915 was introduced and read a first and second time. By-Law 16, to appoint collectors for 1915, and 18 to levy rates for 1915, were read a third time, signed by the Reeve and Clerk and entered in By-Law book.—Carried.

Mr. Graham moved, seconded by Mr. Brown that in regard to turnouts on fill in St. Hubert, now being built by the Hydro Commission, this Council will insist that they be placed so as to divide the distance of fill into three equal parts.—Carried.

Mr. Cameron moved, seconded by Mr. Brown that the report of Mr. Graham in Division 2, on work amounting to \$392.05, be received and he be paid \$200.00 for 14 days overtime and \$22.91 commission on \$229.12 expended.—Carried.

Mr. Graham moved, seconded by Mr. Brown that the report of Mr. Cameron on special work on Div. 1 be received and he be paid \$5.00 for three days' overtime work on townline amounting to \$29.00, and \$4.00 also on the 14th line bridge \$15.41, on half day \$1.00 and on Puffer's bridge expending \$34.21, amounting some one day \$2.00, and one day inspecting bridges.—Carried.

Mr. Brown moved, seconded by Mr. Cameron that the account of Owen Sound, \$6.60, for advertising bridge tenders, be paid.—Carried.

Mr. Brown moved, seconded by Mr. Cameron that the following accounts for gravel used on roads by overseer be paid, viz: John Beecher, \$2.50; C. Ekin, \$1.00; J. H. Watson, \$1.00; Colin McLean, \$7.00; Malcolm McLean, \$3.00; S. Martin, \$1.00; D. Symes, \$1.00; L. Jones, \$1.50; Mr. McPhail, \$1.20; H. Hinks, \$1.00.—Carried.

Mr. Cameron moved, seconded by Mr. Brown that the Clerk arrange a day to meet the Ephraim representatives in regard to settlement of expenditure of money and statute labor on town line A and B.—Carried.

Mr. Alcorn moved, seconded by Mr. Cameron that the Reeve and Clerk execute deeds of the original 12th concession line to the parties adjoining the same and upon execution by Mr. Robert Graham of deed, he be paid \$200.00 for deviation through lots 22 and 23, con. 12.—Carried.

Mr. Cameron moved, seconded by Mr. Graham that in accordance with petitions submitted to this Council by residents of Eugenia and Ceylon Villages, the Hydro-Electric Power Commission be requested to submit estimates of cost of light and power to petitioners.—Carried.

Council adjourned.—Advance.
