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Markdale Standard

Light on the Subject.

A notice in last week's Standard called attention to the fact, that application is necessary for permission to install electric wiring in buildings not already wired or to make additions to existing installations, in order to comply with provincial regulations. Authorized application forms which may be procured at my office are to be filled in with the names of the persons, for whom the proposed work is to be done, a description of the premises, the number of proposed light outlets and switch outlets, on each floor, and the name of the Electrician who will do the work.

The application form when filled out is to be forwarded to the inspector for the district, Mr. W. H. Crookshank, of Palmerston, accompanied with the amount of the inspection fees called for in each particular case. These fees are ten cents for permit, ten cents for inspection fee for each proposed light or switch outlet for the first ten outlets, and smaller amounts as per schedule for additional outlets, the minimum fee being 50 cents. On receipt of application and fees the inspector will issue a permit for the work to be done. The work will be inspected while in progress, and when completed satisfactorily, a certificate to that effect will be given to the owner, or occupant and permission to deliver power will be given to Minnis Bros., while they are supplying the current and to the Municipal Hydro Board, when Hydro Power is to be used.

The foregoing regulations are altogether apart from the procedure necessary to bring existing installations up to the required Standard. It is the duty of the inspector to visit all premises which contain electric wiring installations, whether the current is supplied by the Bell Telephone Co., and the Consolidated Telephone Co., of Caledon have decided to run another line from Caledon to Orangeville.
