THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

INTERNATIONAL LESSON. OCTOBER 10. Lesson II.—Elijah Taken Up into Heaven, 2 Kings 2, 1-12a. Golden Text: Psa. 16, 11.

1. Elijah Refuses to Leave Elijah (Verses 1-6). Verse 1. When Jehovah would take up Elijah—The narrative of today's lesson was, of course, supplied by Elijah, as only he was present when Elijah was caught up into the chariot of fire.

2. Held by Your Peace. It is said that others have seen the chariot of fire, and the prophet's solemn mission. He, however, appreciated the fact. So Elijah held them firmly to hold their peace.

3. At the Jordan (Verses 7-10). 7. Fifty Men.—The life of a prophet was not secure under the reign of such kings as Ahab and his children. Those who were giving their lives for the sacred calling of God, and of themselves together in grief and sorrow, the time being lived in a moment. Such bands are mentioned at other places also.

4. Wrapped it Together. Made a bundle out of it, reminding one of Moses and his rod at the Nile (Exod. 17, 20). 9. When they were gone over the Jordan, the Jordan, Elijah stood upon the slopes of his high ground.

10. A hard thing.—The Spirit of God was not in the power of Elijah's betow. It must come from God himself. Elijah was careful to let his people know that only as he (Elijah) was himself in close touch with God could he come into possession of God's Spirit.

11. A chariot of fire and horses of fire.—Compare 2 Kings 6, 17. 12. My father, my father.—A prophet by the younger prophets to the older prophets. The chariots of Israel and the presence thereof—Elijah recognized that Elijah was a greater defense to Israel than all her military resources.
