tine miles of his homestead on a farm of a; least to acres; on certain conditions. A hapitable house is required except where recidence is verformed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in rood standing may pre-empt a quarter-ection alongside his homestead. Price 6:00 per acres. Duties—six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead nation; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption, natent may be obtained as soon as homestead gatent, on certain conditions.

A cettler who has exhausted his home-stead right may take a purchased home-tead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per sere. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and creet a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to re-duction in case of rough, secubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
