BY BOTH VOICE AND SIGHT BY WIRELESS SYSTEM.

Nikola Tesla Thinks. His Plan Will Allow Us to Talk Through the Earth.

Nikola Tesla, of New York, anounced recently that he has received patent on an invention which will t eliminate static interference, the resent - bugaboo of wireless telephony, but would enable thousands of persons to talk at once between wireess stations and make it possible for hose talking to see one another by wireless, regardless of the distance separating them. He said also that with his wireless station now in the process of construction on Long Island he hoped to make New York one, of the central exchanges in a world: system of wireless telephony.

Mr. Tesla has been working on ircless problems for many years. He has exhibited an article publihsed in the Electrical World cleven years ago, in which he predicted not only wireless telephony on a commercial basis, but that it would be possible to identify the voice of an acquaintance over any distance. That its operator in Hawaii was able to distinguish the voice of an engineer friend at Arlington, Va., was announced by the Amer ican Telephone and Telegraph Company as the most marked triumph of its communication by wireless telephone from the naval radio station at Arlington to Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, a istance of 4,600 miles.
